Stapleton's New Fire Station To Open in August

veryone who enjoys the traditional d architecture of Stapleton's urban ✓ neighborhoods will find the same appeal in the design of the new fire station the Denver Fire Department will open on Martin Luther King Boulevard in August of this year. Located across from the former airport's parking structure, the new fire house replaces Denver Fire Station 26, an aging facility currently operating at 38th and Pontiac.

Designed by Oz Architecture, the fire station has the Tudor style design intended to recall the look of a traditional fire house, said Lt. Phil Champagne, public information officer for the Denver Fire Department. "We wanted it to look like a fire house," he said.

While the new fire station has the look of a traditional fire house, the design and layout of the one story, three-bay structure not only has a number of very

modern components but at least one "throwback" to earlier times: the living quarters for 13 firefighters will utilize "Murphy beds" that fold away into the wall when not in use to make the most of space.

As with most fire houses, training and physical fitness programs necessary to keep firefighters prepared to respond to life-and-death emergencies are planned for in the design of the facility. A tower attached to the new fire station will be utilized for "high angle" rescue training. Provisions to maintain physical fitness will include an outdoor jogging track that may also be available to the community. The firehouse is being constructed by Golden Triangle Construction Company.

Emphasis on Good Health Shapes Stapleton Lifestyle

he construction of a new, two story 50,000 square foot medical office building in Stapleton's East 29th Avenue Town Center adjacent to the Walgreens will do more than re-shape the "skyline" at Stapleton - it will also change the way many families in Stapleton and the surrounding neighborhoods receive their medical care.

When completed late this year, the Town Center medical office building will serve as the new location for the University Family Medicine - A.F. Williams Center. Operated by the physicians of the University of Colorado Hospital, the Center will offer a "full spectrum of care, from general wellness care to emergency medicine." The self-described mission of the University Family Medicine -A.F. Williams Center is to provide family medicine physicians who are trained to (continued on page 3)



Parks For All Seasons at Stapleton



No better time to appreciate the beauty of winter as it fades away this year, while anticipating the excitement that spring provides, only 4 blocks away. No, I am not talking about the ever-changing Colorado weather, but the four new neighborhood parks that will open at Stapleton this year. Located along Dayton Street north of Martin Luther King Jr Boulevard, the parks are named for the four seasons of the year, while providing astonishing views of the Front Range.

At the Spring Park, located at Elmira Court, residents can enjoy the spectacular array of color that spring unveils, while enjoying a stroll through a garden and activity lawn. Plant material for the park was chosen based on springtime characteristics and early season blooms that will exhibit a variety of colors and fragrances. The park might also become a gathering place around the centrally located May pole. May Day is observed around the world to celebrate the ending of winter, and the beginning of the spring


The Summer Park on Emporia Court was designed to accommodate a seating area for parents to relax and watch the playground where children can exhaust their abundant amount of energy. The park provides a large open lawn area for active and passive summer activities at Stapleton. The planting of the park is intended to capture the energy from the summer winds and provide shade from the summer sun, while providing interest throughout the

In the Autumn Park, on 33rd Avenue, residents can experience the best that the autumn season has to offer. With plant material selected for intense fall colors and late season blooms; the park has an open lawn area for outdoor activities and a spectacular view of the sunset along the Front Range. Autumn Park also offers protection from the daytime sun under the elevated pergola that frames the view towards Mt Evans.

Winter Park on 34th Avenue was designed to capture the brilliance of winter while providing areas for activity and fun. The plant material was selected to provide windbreak during (continued on page 10)

Could you publish some statistics about racial/ ethnic diversity at Stapleton?

Forest City does not keep statistics of that nature.

Is anything being done (i.e., community outreach) to increase diversity of homeowners?

Forest City's marketing efforts conducted with its homebuilders utilize a number of channels in the minority community designed to promote diversity at Stapleton. Forest City also works closely with the Housing Diversity Committee of the Stapleton Citizens Advisory Board and the City and County of Denver to provide information about home buying opportunities and rental homes at Stapleton. When will Smith Road be complete from Havana to Quebec?

Although the Stapleton Development Plan envisions the extension of Smith Road east to Havana, there is no current timetable for that to happen.

Will the parking structure (used by RTD and DIA) on MLK be torn down or renovated? If so, when?

While a timetable is not yet certain, current plans call for Forest City to redevelop the structure once the RTD park-nride is relocated north to Smith Road where a new "multimodal" facility serving bus, auto, rail, bicycle and pedestrian transportation is planned immediately east of Wal-Mart in Quebec Square.

What role does the Stapleton Security play within the community? If we see someone/something suspicious, especially in new construction areas, can we call Stapleton Security to check it out? If not, what is their role, other than driving around?

Stapleton Security is paid for by the homebuilders to patrol homes under construction and model homes. Anyone who sees suspicious activity in any area of Stapleton is encouraged to notify the Denver Police by calling 911.

When will the Westerly Creek bike path be extended to connect to Sand Creek?

Most likely in 2008, following the construction of the 35th Avenue bridge over Westerly Creek and the completion of some environmental remediation west of Westerly Creek.

You've Asked...

There may be some temporary connections from the residential development in Filing 12 (east of Westerly Creek and north of MLK Boulevard) by summer 2006.

What will the connectivity be between Stapleton south of I-70 and the new housing and commercial north of I-70?

While a timetable has not yet been established, a new interchange is envisioned on Interstate 70 approximately at the point where the old Cargo Road crosses over

the interstate. Central Park Boulevard will be extended to north Interstate 70 utilizing that interchange. Existing connections include Quebec and Havana streets.

When will RTD bus service come/exist on 29th Ave. to Beeler as originally stated by Visitors Center in 2003? I hope it will be soon.

Bus service on 29th Avenue will not be possible until 2007, when MLK Boulevard has been completed to Peoria. Contact the Stapleton RTD Board Representative Chris Martinez at 303-299-2303 for more information.

What organization is responsible for street lights? We still don't have street lights on our street yet (E. 27th Drive).

The installation and initial power-up of streetlights is the responsibility of the Park Creek Metropolitan District. For information on the schedule for the installation of street lights, contact Stapleton Community Manager Diane Deeter at communitymanager@StapletonDenver.com. After streetlights are installed and operational, they become the responsibility of Xcel Energy. To report a light that is not working, copy down the number on the pole that identifies the light and call Xcel Energy at 1-800-895-4999.

What is Colorado Studios?

Located in a former general aviation terminal and hangar complex along Central Park Boulevard in southern Stapleton, Colorado Studios is one of the nation's most sophisticated centers for high definition television services. There's been recent activity on the parcel north of Syracuse Village. What's going on?

Construction is underway on the second phase of Syracuse Village, which should be offering pre-sales of the units in the first quarter of this year.

When will the Bladium repaint its exterior? We were originally told by summer 2005 — now they won't give a date.

Also, can the Bladium be asked
or helped to reorganize their parking
lots to accommodate more cars? It is underused because it
isn't lined out, and parking spills out onto residential streets.
Forest City is discussing those issues with Bladium at this time.

Any small bus big lines?

What is happening to the parcel next to Bladium? Jim Chrisman of Forest City mentioned that Bladium has an option to buy it but probably will not exercise that option.

Bladium chose not to exercise its option. Forest City is evaluating what to do with that parcel of land at this time.

What is to become of the lot (big mound) on the corner of Wabash

and Central Park? Originally, it was supposed to be green space.

While it is unclear which parcel the question refers to, it is likely either the future site of live-work housing or affordable rental housing.

Any plans for a Toys 'R Us or better yet, a Babies 'R Us?

Forest City is conducting a wide search for specialty retailers throughout the U.S. to be added to Stapleton. The details regarding the scheduled opening of these tenants are not released until leases are signed.

I would like more information on some of the stores going into NorthField.

In addition to the Super Target, Circuit City and Bass Pro Shops Outdoor World stores that are open now, NorthField will have "main street" retail that will be anchored on one end by an 18-screen Harking Movie Theatre Complex and the other end by a Macy's Department Store. Forest City will announce the names of other tenants once those leases are signed.

What is going on with 29th and Town Center Drive? Can a sign or signal be put in?

Thanks to the efforts of the Stapleton United Neighbors and the City and County of Denver, a stop sign has been installed on 29th Avenue (by Noodles and the Coral Room).

Can we PLEASE get some regular playground equipment at the second pool? Maybe slides and swings. My young daughter and neighbors cannot play with it.

Stapleton's pools and adjacent parks are managed by the Stapleton Master Community Association. Can someone put away the chairs at the new pool? They are an eyesore. Thank you.

The chairs will normally be stored inside the pool restrooms during the off season. This year, warranty work underway in those restrooms has required the chairs to be left outside. Upon completion of the work, the chairs will be moved inside.

What is going on east side of Fulton Street?

Details will not be known until March of this year.

What will be the commercial development along east side of Central Park? How about a coffee shop/café?

The east side of Central Park is the Westerly Creek Open Space. The recreation center under design for the east end of Central Park is anticipated to have a small food service facility.

Any small buses through development to connect to big lines?

Circulator buses are a possibility. The decision will be made by RTD once the demand is there.

Why is the light at Syracuse and MLK so long (2 minutes), and why does turning left create an automatic stop at the light at Roslyn?

Timing of the signal lights at Stapleton is established by

the City and County of Denver, just as it is at all locations throughout the city. To register a comment, work with the Transportation Advisory Committee of Stapleton United Neighbors, which meets monthly at the Stapleton Visitor Center. Call 303-355-9600 to confirm the time and date of the next meeting.

Can anything be done about trains' whistles/signals (especially during the night)?

Federal regulations approved in June of last year now allow cities to silence train horns. For more information, visit www.fra.dot.gov.

How far to the east of Fulton Street in Filing #12 will the Town Center be located?

Three blocks.

Specifically, north of MLK to 32nd Ave. will these be residential on the east side of Fulton Street? And how many blocks before hitting the Town Center?

The type of residential will not be known until later this spring. The Havana Town Center will be located at paired couplets of the extension of Martin Luther King Boulevard.

I continue to be concerned at the traffic speed on Roslyn/Syracuse, across 29th coming through the Town Center. Watching people run across the street to avoid speeding cars seems contradictory

to the pedestrian-friendly concept of this neighborhood. What will it take to get lights at that intersection?

New stop sign in the East 29th

Avenue Town Center.

The Transportation Committee of Stapleton United Neighbors (SUN) has been working on that and other issues of concern to Stapleton residents. We recommend that you attend meetings of the committee, which are held at the Stapleton Visitor Center on the second Tuesday of each month from 6:30 to 8 p.m. Call 303-355-9600 to confirm the time and date of a meeting.

Is there going to be a post office within Stapleton?

Forest City has spoken to the U.S. Postal Service (USPS) about bringing a post office to Stapleton, but to date those discussions have not been conclusive due to USPS budget constraints. Please keep in mind that there is a 24 hour full service general mail facility at 53rd and Quebec, on the western edge of the NorthField Retail Center.

What is the plan for the two open parcels of land between Roslyn and Syracuse on 28th Ave.?

That land is planned for the 2nd phase of Botanica on the Green Apartments.

When will the park at the confluence of Westerly Creek and Sand Creek be done?

There is no set timetable for construction of the park planned at the confluence of Westerly Creek and Sand Creek at this time. The confluence park and the extension of the Westerly Creek bike path to Sand Creek are not likely to be complete until 2008, following the construction of the 35th Avenue bridge over Westerly Creek and the completion of some environmental remediation west of Westerly Creek. There may be some temporary connections to the Sand Creek trail from the residential development in Filing 12 (east of Westerly Creek and north of MLK Boulevard) by summer of this year.

Can the Police Academy use the old long-term parking lot north of Smith Road for driving training?

That parking lot no longer exists. However, the Denver Police Academy is planning to relocate all of its training operations to a new facility between Smith Road and Interstate 70. A specific timetable is not yet available.

Is Beazer coming back as a builder?

There are no plans at this time.

draft program plan for the new K-8 campus at Stapleton is beginning to take shape.

A committee of parents, teachers and community members began meeting in December to develop a plan outlining the mission, vision, values and goals for West-

erly Creek Elementary and the next DPS school (temporarily known as Stapleton II), which is set to open in August on Montview Boulevard just east of Central Park Boulevard.

This month the committee will distribute information about the proposed plan for public comment. A public meeting will also be held for more input

from the community. A final proposal will then go to the Denver School Board later this month or in March.

The Denver School Board in November approved the reconfiguration of Westerly Creek to an Early Childhood Education (ECE) to grade three school, and to make Stapleton II a grade 4-8 school. The two will be considered a K-8 campus in two buildings. (The second

school was designed to be a K-8 school. Both schools can revert to their original configurations in the future if community needs change.)

The reconfiguration was developed to meet the needs of the growing number of infants and toddlers living at Stapleton. It will also help ensure that the schools, which are located less than a half mile apart, become a true community learning center.

The program planning committee has developed a mission statement for the new campus: The new school "is a community centered educational campus committed to academic excellence, individual creativity,

and civic responsibility where all learners thrive.

The committee has held in-depth discussions about how to fulfill that mission on daily basis. Common themes the committee believes are essential: community engagement, academic rigor, economic and cultural diversity, educating

> the whole child, high expectations, differentiated instruction to meet the variety of needs of students, innovation, community involvement, character education, teacher professional development and enrichment opportunities.

The committee usually meets on Mondays, from 6:30-8:30 p.m. at the Stapleton

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

"I think it's important to introduce children to the natural world around us with something they can truly enjoy learning about," said Stacy Armitage, U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service education specialist and writer/editor of *Go!wild*.



Proper Disposal of Batteries

Laptops, personal audio players, cell phones and toys are just some of the items used regularly that need batteries to function. Batteries contain toxic heavy metals, including nickel cadmium, alkaline, mercury, nickel metal hydride and lead acid. It is these elements that can threaten the environment if not properly discarded. Batteries that end up in landfills and incinerators leak into the environment and end up in the food chain, causing serious health risks to humans and animals.

online Recycling Directory at www.DenverGov.org/Recycle/ <u>Directory.asp</u>. Using rechargeable batteries helps use fewer batteries, however rechargeable batteries still contain heavy metals so it is important to recycle both your rechargeable and non-rechargeable batteries. To find locations to

Tips for Extending the Life of Batteries

- Turn off any battery-operated appliances when they are not in use.
- · Remove batteries from appliances if they are not going to be used for a long time.
- To prevent a potential safety hazard, do not store old batteries with new batteries. When old and new batteries are stored together, leaking or rupturing could occur.
- Do not recharge a battery unless it is specifically marked "rechargeable." Attempting to recharge a nonrechargeable battery can cause it to leak or rupture.
- Do not open battery casings.

Keeping Pets Healthy

Why is my dog scratching?

Good question. The answer is not always so easy. You and your veterinarian will have to do some detective work and take some time, perhaps weeks to months, to find an answer and then a solution to persistent scratching.

The sorts of things that your veterinarian will consider:

- 1) Age: young dogs more commonly present with skin mites such as demodex. Your veterinarian may recommend a "skin scrape" and look under the microscope to visualize mites. Treatment usually involves shampoos and dips in medication designed to kill the mites. Be aware: the treatment for mites can take many weeks. Patience is usually your best weapon. Adult animals will more often be seen for such ailments as allergies (discussed below) and skin infections. Skin infections can arise on their own, or be secondary to some other problem. The immediate solution is usually antibiotics.
- 2) Breed: Golden Retrievers, Dalmatians, and many small terrier breeds are more likely to suffer from allergies from something in the environment. West Highland white terriers are more likely to develop a secondary yeast skin infection. Chinese Shar Peis are often seen for environmental allergies, food allergies, skin infections, and skin mites.
 - 3) Sex: males and females seem to suffer equally from itchy problems.
- 4) Diet: food allergies and intolerances can cause itchiness in dogs and cats. Beware: bad reactions to food can often be associated with other allergic skin conditions.
- 5) Environment: <u>fleas</u>—not normally a problem in Colorado. It's just too dry here. That being said, there are a small number of isolated areas that seem to harbor them. If you discover them, or if your veterinarian says your pet has fleas, then you should contact an exterminator to have your home rid of them; there will be many more fleas in your home than on your pet at any one time. In any event you notice your pet scratching, see your veterinarian before simply going out and buying a flea collar the problem is probably NOT fleas.
- 6) Human contacts: two skin parasites that can infect people are Ringworm (a fungus) and Cheyletiella (a skin mite). If your doctor says you have either of these two conditions, then you should see your veterinarian with your pet, because it is likely that your pet harbors these parasites. Rest assured that both these parasites can be cured with a moderate amount of effort.
- 7) Seasonal scratching: this is a very good clue that your pet has allergies. Like anyone with allergies, simple control with an antihistamine such as Benadryl may be all you need for sufficient control. If not, then your pet may benefit from allergy testing either by intradermal skin test or by a simple blood test. The results will answer whether or not your pet is allergic to something in the environment, and will help the laboratory to develop allergy shots. That's right. Allergy shots for your pet. Your veterinarian will help initiate this treatment and can even show you how to do these shots at home. Very often, this is a welcome answer to a very uncomfortable itchy situation.

In summary then, discovering and treating the cause of scratching usually requires the help of your local veterinarian. There are many approaches and treatments, and your veterinarian is always the best guide.



Tax Deductions When Buying or Selling a Home

What is tax deductible in the loan process?

I. Home acquisition mortgage loan fees. If you paid a loan fee when purchasing a primary or secondary home, usually called "points", that fee qualifies as an itemized interest deduction. Each point paid equals 1% of the amount borrowed.



3. When refinancing, deduct any loan fees that have not already been claimed. Thanks to continuing low mortgage interest rates, you may have refinanced in the past year. Any loan fee you paid can be deducted over the life of the mortgage.

4. If you bought or sold property, remember to deduct prorated real estate taxes. A major tax deduction many real estate buyers overlook is the prorated property tax they paid at their closing. Even if the other party paid the taxes to the taxing agency, but you were charged a prorated portion of the tax bill, be sure to deduct your share on your tax return.

5. Deduct prorated mortgage interest in the year of purchase or sale. If you bought

a residence, don't forget to deduct your prorated interest share for the month of the sale. Your closing settlement statement shows your prorated share of the mortgage interest.

6. Mortgage prepayment penalty.

If you paid off an existing mortgage early and were charged a prepayment penalty by the

lender, that prepayment penalty may qualify as an itemized deduction.

7. Home construction loan interest. If you built a home, don't forget to deduct the construction loan interest you paid. It is deductible if the construction period does not exceed 24 months before occupancy of your principal residence.

To take full advantage of tax breaks available to you contact your tax advisor. A copy of your settlement statements should be available to you from your Realtor. You do "have" a Realtor, don't you? If you don't, it's time you did.





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Eat Good Food

A Valentine's Day Menu a la Cupid

It's here: the dead of winter. And although spring might be just a few weeks away, we in Colorado know that the really bad stuff won't start falling until March. Luckily someone realized that this bleak month needed a little perking up and invented Valentine's Day Thank goodness, 'cause President's Day is just not exciting enough to carry me through this dark month.

For those wishing to mark that day of love with a meal that might lead to some serious romance later in the evening, let me offer up my own suggestion for a menu that will ignite the romance fire, but not, ahem, kill it.

First, the course that sets the tone for the evening - the avocado salad. Find a perfectly ripe avocado. And then go and splurge on the best bottle of olive oil you can afford. Ditto for balsamic vinegar. True balsamic is probably out of most people's budget (it certainly is mine!) and runs anywhere from \$500-\$1,000 for a small vial. But you can get some very decent approximations; the Peppercorn in Boulder has a wonderful selection of fine olive oils and balsamic vinegars.

To make the avocado salad, simply cut the avocado in half and remove the pit with one swift whack of the knife to the pit and pull up, removing the pit in one full motion. In the indentions left by the pit, pour in a little olive oil and a tiny circle of balsamic vinegar - together, enough to fill to the top of the brim of the avocado. Grind fresh black pepper and coarse sea salt over the top. Serve with a teaspoon. Now, sit back and watch your mate swoon as they dip their spoon into the soft, succulent flesh of the avocado while the olive oil and balsamic dance alongside. The decadence of eating an entire half of an avocado and nothing else for a salad should definitely set the tone for the evening. This also makes an impressive first course for a fancy dinner party.

After the avocado, prepare a plate full of tasty, but simple, nibbles. My list of favorites involve two really good cheeses, like an Italian Taleggio and a English well-aged cheddar, but truly anything works. I include on my tray some fresh figs, freshly roasted walnuts or almonds in nothing but a little olive oil and salt, grapes, olives, roasted red peppers and a loaf of really good bread. Take your time to just enjoy the food, savoring each small bite. In the morning put the cheese out to come to room temperature and allow all the flavors to come out.

For dessert the temptation at Valentine's Day is to either buy chocolate-dipped strawberries or a big box of chocolates. Don't. Both are usually mediocre at best. Strawberries used for dipping are purposefully overgrown so they have zero flavor left, and in addition they're dipped in really low-grade chocolate most of the time. The big shiny Valentine's boxes are perfect for the kids, but not for your significant other. So instead, why not go to your favorite chocolate shop or high-end grocery store and buy just a morsel of chocolate to share with your beloved over a bottle of champagne. The new recreational cooking school in downtown, Mise En Place, has a wonderful assortment of Wen Chocolates – just voted one of the top ten chocolatiers in the United States (www.miseenplaceschool.com). If you can find some organic raspberries, they might be a good accompaniment, but chances are in February they're also going to be grown in Mexico and not full of taste.

The next suggestion is to refrain from enjoying these savory bites until the children are in bed, the TV is off, and you and your mate are sitting in a room filled with good music, a fire and some candles. My guess is that your evening will be more enjoyable than getting dressed up, finding and arranging a babysitter, driving in the chilly night, hunting for a parking space, and then sitting down in a crowded restaurant that is going a bit overboard with its Valentine's theme. Not only will you savor each of these nibbles, but chances are it will be a little more magical and a lot less stressful. Plus, with the exception of the high-fat content of the cheese (at least it's loaded with calcium), you'll feel good eating low on the food chain, but high on the quality of the food, all in the comfort of your own home.

While the increased cost of raw materials and the many competing priorities for proceeds from Stapleton bond financing are always a challenge, when completed, Central Park and the Stapleton Recreation Center will provide residents with places to come together as a neighborhood for social, athletic, and educational purposes. For many residents, these facilities were the key components in their decision to move to Stapleton to enjoy an "active living" lifestyle. Central Park and the Recreation Center will also bolster Stapleton's community spirit and "sense of place" by providing a nucleus for neighborhood activities. Please show your support for the Recreation Center and offer your input at one of the two upcoming public forums this month! Stapleton Included in One of First Study Areas for **Denver Strategic Transportation Plan**

A large group of Stapleton residents recently attended a public meeting to discuss long-term transportation needs in the "Quebec travel shed," and to weigh in on the possibility of widening Quebec between 23rd and 6th Avenue. The Denver Department of Public Works is holding a series of public meetings in the process of developing a long-term, city-wide strategic transportation plan and has chosen the Quebec travel shed (which includes most of the Lowry and Stapleton developments) as one of its first areas of study, because of its peculiarly high growth. The Denver Regional Council of Governments has projected that northern part of the area east of Monaco and south of I-70 will see a 100% increase in traffic by the year 2030.

Approximately 40 residents of Stapleton, East Montclair, Lowry, Park Hill and other northeast Denver neighborhoods attended the December 13, 2005 meeting. There was a lively discussion of the advantages, disadvantages and potential cost of widening Quebec south of 23rd and north of 6th Avenue. One proponent of widening Quebec maintained that the change is inevitable and long overdue and pointed out that the idea of widening Quebec dates back plans developed several years ago during the Webb administration. Several vocal opponents to widening Quebec expressed concern that the change would ruin the character of their

neighborhood. The possibility of converting Quebec and Syracuse/Roslyn to one way streets going in opposite directions (like 13th and 14th) as an alternative to widening Quebec was mentioned but no one at the meeting spoke in favor, and a number spoke against, the one way streets alternative.

Most of the public comments, however, did not focus on traffic issues. To the surprise of many of those in attendance, the principal concerns expressed by attendees from all the neighborhoods were:

- The location and frequency of service from existing bus routes. There was a consensus that bus service should be within convenient walking distance of more residents, that existing service should be more frequent and that routes should be changed to provide more convenient service within the travel shed.
- Safe pedestrian and bicycle routes within neighborhoods other than Stapleton and Lowry (everyone spoke highly of the pedestrian and bicycle routes within Stapleton and Lowry), including the need for sidewalks in East Montclair and East Park Hill.
- Safe pedestrian and bicycle access between neighborhoods; for example, to and from Stapleton across Quebec and Montview and to and from Lowry across 11th and Quebec.

You can express your views regarding transportation issues in the Quebec travel shed by filling out a Community Values Worksheet, adding your thoughts about the Quebec travel shed issues in the comments section, section 8, on the Denver Strategic Transportation Plan website: http://www.keepdenvermoving.org/ survey/individual.

The Quebec travel shed boundaries are Alameda to Smith Road and Monaco to Yosemite (Central Park Boulevard in Stapleton). Major north-south streets in the travel shed include Quebec, Syracuse/Roslyn, Central Park Boulevard/Yosemite and Monaco. Major eastwest streets include Martin Luther King, Montview and 13th, 14th and 17th.



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

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Reproductive Health for Women

any women do not think about their reproductive health until they are pregnant. As in all areas of medicine, prevention and health promotion can provide better and healthier results. In the case of a pregnancy the goal is to optimize the health of mother and fetus. In fetal development, the development of brain and internal organs occurs during the first trimester. Critical development often occurs before the first prenatal visit. This is why it is important to discuss health concerns with your provider prior to a pregnancy.

During a preconception visit it is important to talk to your health care provider about medical history and current medications, including over-the-counter medications and herbal supplements. If you have diabetes or hypertension, it is important to have them under good control prior to becoming pregnant. Not only will the chances of conception increase but poorly controlled diabetes or hypertension can lead to pregnancy complications such as pre-term labor and growth abnormalities. Additionally, some medications for diabetes and hypertension are not safe to use during pregnancy. Your physician will be able to adjust your medications to safer choices prior to a pregnancy. Also many seizure medications are not safe during pregnancy and can be changed to alternatives.

In addition to your medical history it is important to discuss your general health and lifestyle habits with your provider. Following are some areas that you should address together:

Body Mass Index: Body mass index is a ratio of your height and weight. A BMI of less than 20 or greater than 30 can adversely affect conception and pregnancy outcomes.

Nutrition: Nutrition is important, especially the intake of folic acid. A daily intake of 0.4 mg of folic acid at least a month prior to conception and throughout the pregnancy is recommended to prevent neural tube defects such as disorders of the spine and brain. Many breakfast cereals contain folic acid but unfortunately not at the required dose.

Vitamins: Most prenatal vitamins have the required dose of folic acid and are the easiest way to get the recommended daily allowance. A diet rich in calcium and iron is important but not to exceed 400 IU of Vitamin D a day.

Alcohol and Tobacco: Alcohol and tobacco use is not advised during pregnancy. Exposure to alcohol during any trimester may lead to fetal alcohol syndrome or varying degrees of the syndrome. Smoking may lead to premature labor and delivery, growth disorders and possible death of a fetus. There are many smoking cessation programs that can be discussed with your physician or provider.

Exercise: Daily exercise is suggested with limits on elevated body temperature and increased pulse greater than 140. Vigorous exercise as well as increased body temperature from hot tubs and saunas have been associated with fetal abnormalities.

Vaccinations: Live vaccinations are not recommended during pregnancy. However, influenza vaccine, which is not a live vaccine, is recommended in the preconception period and throughout the pregnancy.

Family History: Genetic history is also important to discuss prior to a pregnancy. It is helpful to understand the risk of various inherited disorders and the screening tests that are available.

Screenings: Screening for infectious diseases is suggested for all persons. This includes gonorrhea, syphilis, chlamydia, human papilloma virus, hepatitis B and HIV. Also screening for immunity for rubella and varicella virus (chicken pox) may decrease birth defects that are associated with exposure to these viruses.

Domestic Violence: It is crucial to discuss domestic violence issues with your provider at any visit. Domestic violence can be helped with provider intervention which can improve the pregnancy outcome.

Pregnancy can be both an exciting and stressful experience. Planning and preconception care can decrease the worry and maximize healthy maternal and fetal outcomes. Remember, healthy mothers have healthier babies.

Decorating with Framed Mirrors

The typical mirror is a sheet of glass that is coated on its back with aluminum or silver that produces images by reflection. The mirrors used in Greco-Roman antiquity and throughout the European Middle Ages were simply slightly convex disks of metal, either bronze, tin, or silver, that reflected light off their highly polished surfaces. A method of backing a plate of flat glass with a thin sheet of reflecting metal came into widespread production in Venice during the 16th century when an amalgam of tin and mercury was used as the reflecting metal. Justus von Liebig discovered the chemical process of coating a glass surface with metallic silver in 1835, and this advance inaugurated the modern techniques of mirror making. Present-day mirrors are made by sputtering a thin layer of molten aluminum or silver onto the back of a plate of glass in a vacuum.

Mirrors combine function and décor. They can be used to multiply the light in a room or reflect a view to an adjoining space, making a room seem larger. Grouping small, but dramatically framed mirrors on a wall can become the focal point of the room.

Every room of the house can benefit from framed mirrors. While the practical use of

mirrors in bathrooms and bedrooms is obvious, adding a unique frame around the bathroom mirror can add a designer touch to a functional element. A full length bedroom mirror, framed in a wide casing, can be placed on the floor leaning on the wall - offering the functional aspect of checking your appearance and the décor element of

enhancing the space with added reflective light and depth to the room.

Because children love looking at themselves in a mirror, a child's room is the ideal place to frame and hang a mirror. With the wide choice of frames available today, it is easy to match the décor of a child's room. For an infant, place the mirror near the baby's changing table, this will keep the child occupied while you are doing the changing. In a toddler's or older child's room, be sure to mount a mirror at the child's eye level.

Hallways can appear more spacious with strategically placed mirrors. If you have a grouping of small artwork or photographs in your hallway, place small, framed mirrors in

the groupings to open the space and reflect light. Or place a framed mirror behind the objects on a hall stand to reflect the items, such as candles, a sculpture or a vase of flowers. Mirrors add magic to a room. They visually expand small areas, add drama and depth to existing décor, and create mood by redirecting light and reflecting the glow of a candle, chandelier, or fireplace. Dramatically framed mirrors over a fireplace will add warmth to the room, or hang a mirror on either side of the fireplace to help the room feel bigger.




