

New Technology Transforms the Effectiveness of Online Search

Colorado-based company that is the first client for CTEK's new ven-Lture center at Stapleton is helping businesses stretch their search engine marketing dollars through a powerful new technology called "VisitorTrack."

Known as "netFactor" (www.netFactor. com), the company is able to uncover dramatic details about the visitors to its clients' websites.

"It's just like caller id for a website" said Christopher Jeffers, CEO of netFactor. "VisitorTrack automatically captures detailed insight on the businesses visiting a website without that Visitor ever having to provide any kind of registration. This includes who the business is, just what products they are searching for, contact data like telephone, address or company website. The system even provides executive contacts and names."

Mr. Jeffers said only now are advertisers starting to "do the math." They've watched the stock prices rise at search engines like Google and Yahoo - so much so the value of these internet companies now exceed such old-world firms as General Motors. In fact, between 2004 and 2005, advertisers snatched up 58% more keywords, and are paying more for them. Mr. Jeffers notes this phenomenon has driven Search Engine Marketing to a spending level of \$5.75 billion - a 44% increase over 2004.

Armed with the kind of data Visitor-Track uncovers, businesses can orient their sales and marketing efforts to prospective business customers already searching for their products, and more likely to buy.

"VisitorTrack is the key that really turned our SEO efforts into gold" stated J.T. Gillett who oversees internet marketing for Plexis Healthcare Systems, a user of VisitorTrack. "Successful search engine marketing makes it easy to find our website. But unless visitors downloaded information or requested a live demo, we

did not know anything about them. Our VisitorTrack reports become the basis for follow-up that includes research by our



sales team, a personalized letter pitching targeted benefits, such as a free white paper offer, and a call from a sales team member to suggest additional information about our software's benefits."

"VisitorTrack equips us with key indicators such as who visits our site, how often and where they came from," said Steve Royer, Senior VP and COO of Insession Technologies, a provider of CRM and workflow software "This information is critical because we now know if marketing dollars spent on search engines and keywords are providing a valuable return."

Spanning many industries, including telecommunications, software, and healthcare, netFactor has already grown to nearly

> 20 corporate clients. While VisitorTrack is uncanny at the details it can

uncover about the business visitors to a website, consumers who prefer to anonymously surf have nothing to worry about.

"VisitorTrack is 100% a Business-to-Business technology" explained Mr. Jeffers. "We actively filter out any data that originates from a consumer-oriented ISP like Comcast or AOL. Importantly, no personally identifiable information is ever captured. Instead, VisitorTrack yields detailed information only on the businesses visiting a website."

Mr. Jeffers observes that with the costs of paid advertising on a search engine

projected to continue their escalation, as well as the increased competition for limited web page real estate, business organizations will be seeking to get more from their online marketing investment.

"How much more is that invisible click worth when you can know who it is what they want, and how to reach them?" he asks. "CTEK Stapleton's netFactor is poised to help marketers take those Google clicks to a new level."

Arrest may solve 50 burglaries

Officer Tyson Worrell Selected District Two "Top Cop"

→ he Denver Police Department District Two Top Cop Citizens Committee has selected Officer Tyson Worrell as its "Top Cop" for February 2006.

In announcing the award, the citizens

committee joined Officer Worrell's superiors in saluting his overall outstanding performance and service to the City and County of Denver and the residents of Northeast Denver. During the reporting period of January 23, 2006 until February 11, 2006, Officer

Worrell made 13

Class 2 arrests and 23 Class 1 miscellaneous arrests. Class 2 arrests are arrests which are "officer initiated" or observed and acted upon as compared to Class 1 arrests which are the result of a radio dispatched call.

If not for the motivation of Officer Worrell, these 36 criminals might still be

on the streets committing more crimes. In one case, he learned of the location of two parties wanted in a burglary investigation and organized an arrest team that took the suspects into custody

with their valued possessions.

Because of the rapport that Officer Worrell established with one of the suspects at the time of the arrest, the suspect agreed to cooperate with the

> District Two detectives. Since his arrest, this suspect has admitted to being involved with over 50 burglaries in Denver, since December 2005. He has taken detectives to numerous homes that he and another suspect broke in to and has assisted in recovering large amounts of stolen property. The District Two detectives have also been contacted by investigators in Ohio, Indiana, and Missouri who believe that this suspect and his


accomplice have committed numerous



The Urban Farm Initiates Planning for Agricultural Charter School

Planning has begun to establish Denver's first and only agriculturally based secondary school charter school. A strategic dream of The Urban Farm at Stapleton, The Farm School, which is envisioned to open in the fall of 2007, would serve students in grades six through twelve.

"The Farm School for Applied and Natural Sciences," the current working name for the project, is being designed to engage students in an academically challenging and experientially based educational program within the context of using the natural sciences and agricultural education. The intent of The Farm Charter School will be to unlock the potential of each student through a program that provides intellectual stimulation, develops knowledge and skills and enhances problem solving abilities through the vast "hands-on" opportunities available at The Urban Farm.

Donna Garnett, Executive Director of The Urban Farm, describes the school in this way. "The Farm School is intended to appeal to the middle and high school student who is already thinking about possible careers in veterinary science, natural resources or other biology and life-sciences based careers. We are very excited about the possibilities of guiding youth along a purposeful academic

path that will prepare them for post-secondary programs. The Farm School is a natural extension of the type of learning that children already experience in our after school programs. The excitement and enlightenment that comes with interacting with the farm environment as part of their academic program will be a springboard to academic excellence now and in their future."

Components of the academic program will include curriculum tailored to individual learning styles, developmental needs and intellectual interests; a focus on multicultural and global perspectives; a commitment to the community beyond the school; arts, sciences and humanities equally valued in an interdisciplinary curriculum; learning through direct experience and primary materials; and a commitment to a healthy body through sports and outdoor play.

To learn more about The Farm School for Applied and Natural Sciences, members of the Stapleton Community are invited to attend an information session on Thursday, April 27th at The Urban Farm, which is located near the crossroads of Smith and Havana.

Since You've Asked...

Are there light rail plans for Stapleton?

The FastTracks program includes a rail connection that is likely to be "commuter rail" (diesel-electric rather than overhead electric power) between Downtown Denver and Denver International Airport via the rail corridor that passes through Stapleton along Smith Road. A rail station is planned to be part of a new multi-modal transit station in the area of Smith Road and Ulster.

Will there be a library?

Forest City has been in discussions with The Denver Public Library (DPL) about our interest in bringing a library to Stapleton, but DPL does not have the funds to do so at this time.

When will Smith Road connect between Havana and Quebec?

The Stapleton Development Plan does envision the extension of Smith Road from Quebec Street east to Havana, but there is no specific timetable at this time.

What are the police management plans for Stapleton? We will still be in District 2? Will be have our own precinct?



What are the plans with CPB and I70 Interchange? Short term and long term.

Working with the Colorado Department of Transportation and the Federal Highway Administration, Forest City and the Park Creek Metropolitan District are planning a new interchange on I-70 that would provide new access to Stapleton north and south of the highway via an extension of Central Park Boulevard, a major north-south arterial. Efforts are underway now with the Colorado Congressional Delegation to identify the sources of funding for that interchange.

he Denver school board on March 16 formally named the second school building at Stapleton for William R. Roberts, a longtime city councilman from northeast Denver and prominent leader of the Afro-American community who died in late 2005.

The new Stapleton K-8 school that opens in the fall and includes the second building will be known in common reference as "Westerly Creek Campus."

Mr. Roberts was one of the leading advocates in the 1980s to close Stapleton International Airport and build Denver International Airport. Mr. Roberts was also the city's public works manager and deputy mayor in the early 1990s, as well as a member of the Denver Water Board.

Northeast Denver school board member Kevin Patterson proposed naming the building for Mr. Roberts because of his contribution to the development of the new community on the old airport site.

In the fall, the second school building will form a K-8 school with Westerly Creek Elementary. Westerly Creek will become an ECE to grade three and the second school will serve grades 4-8. The reconfiguration was prompted by the large number of infants and young children living at Stapleton and concern about competition for students and resources between two schools located close together. Westerly Creek is located at 28th Avenue and Akron Street. The second building is approximately a half mile south near Montview and Central Park boulevards.

In late 2004 community members began a process to create one school to preserve a true sense of community. The Denver school board approved the reconfiguration in November 2005.

Many Stapleton families have favored Westerly Creek as part of the name of the new school. Mr. Patterson said he wanted to name the building, not the new K-8 school. He said he welcomed Westerly Creek Campus as the commonly used name for the school. He also agreed that signage at the second building could say "William R. Roberts at Westerly Creek" if an aesthetically pleasing design can be developed.

Don't Let April 15 Pass You By

A pril 15 has long been considered a date to avoid. Visions of tax men coming for your money are common in many advertisements on television and in print.

plan to make a contribution prior to the April 17 deadline. If not, talk to a financial professional as soon as possible to start one.

There are restrictions governing who may contribute to a traditional IRA. If you don't qualify, consider a Roth IRA. You won't get the federal tax advantages now, but qualified withdrawals can be made free of federal income tax during your retirement years.

Either way, having a plan for retirement is important. You owe it to yourself to make the best plan as soon as possible.



Fresh Food Options for Stapleton

here has been a lot of interest by Stapleton residents in increasing access to natural foods. Here's a look at some of the existing ways—besides going to the grocery store—to get fresh and organic foods in the Stapleton area.

Stapleton Farmers Market

The 2006 season of the Stapleton Farmers Market opens on Sunday, June 4th. The Stapleton Farmers Market is managed by Colorado Fresh Markets, a family farmer owned and operated farmers' market system and the organizers of the Cherry Creek Fresh Market. The Stapleton Farmers Market is a community event where you can

run into neighbors. have a fun activity with your family and talk to the people who produce your food, re-establishing a timehonored connection between the consumer and the grower

Typically, produce at the Stapleton Farmers Market is picked that morning or the day before, which ensures the freshest and most nutritious fruits and vegetables. Freshly picked produce is crisp, sweet, and flavorful and the most nutritious since each day produce is in transit or sits in warehouses and grocery stores it loses nutritional value. By shopping at the Stapleton Farmers Market you support the growers directly and therefore help them stay in business. With family owned farm acreage shrinking at an alarming rate, the Stapleton Farmers Market provides an opportunity for growers to continue to farm their land and helps to preserve the agricultural landscape in Colorado. The Stapleton Farmers Market needs community support in order to help the market grow. The Market is held in the 29th Avenue Town Center in the parking lot behind Casey's on Sunday mornings from 8:30 - 12:30. For more information, visit www.stapletondenver.com.

Monroe Organic Farm CSA

Monroe Organic Farm, the oldest organic farm in Colorado, operates a Community Supported Agriculture (CSA) program. Essentially, people in the community join the farm as working or non-working members and receive a percentage of the farm's crops throughout the growing season. The

annual share for 2006, which includes certified organic produce and fruit, costs \$530 for a non-working share or \$290 for a working share. Members can pay additional fees for local honey, organic beef, western slope tree fruit and organic omega-3 eggs.

Members in the Stapleton area pick up their share every Tuesday between July and October between 5:30 and 7 p.m. at a member's home at Alameda and Quebec. Monroe Organic Farm would be willing to add a Stapleton delivery point to their route if there were between 15-32 CSA members at Stapleton. Currently, there are 10 families in Stapleton who are interested in joining Monroe Organic Farm's CSA.

Stapleton Food Co-Op

The Stapleton Food Co-Op is a group of about 10 families who place an order with the ShopNatural Cooperative every four weeks. The ShopNatural Cooperative carries thousands of products from baby food to cleaning products. They typically have about 7,500 products available to members. With sales and volume discounts, members of the Stapleton Food Co-Op have found that they generally save money overall. Some items can actually be more expensive through the ShopNatural Co-Op, but generally the cost of goods is cheaper than buying at local natural food stores. In addition to the cost savings, other advantages of the Stapleton Co-Op include saving time by shopping online from home and having the ability to buy organic staples in bulk. To save grocery trips by using the Stapleton Food Co-Op, one needs to be able to anticipate food needs and stock up for a one month period. But, with a little planning, using the Stapleton Food Co-Op in combination with a produce supplier can almost eliminate regular trips to the grocery store.

There is no cost to join Stapleton Food Co-Op. The ShopNatural Cooperative



charges a co-op fee of 2.25% per order, but the Stapleton Co-Op does not have any of its own overhead and therefore does not charge any fees. Door to Door Organics

Door to Door Organics (DTD) is a home delivery service of organic fruits and vegetables and select organic groceries. DTD buys produce from local farmers during the Colorado growing months. Subscribers can get delivery service every week or every other week. DTD speaks with local farmers and distributors every week to find out what produce is available fresh the following week. DTD then e-mails subscribers a menu of the different types of produce available every Friday. You are allowed up to three substitutions on each order. If groups of four or more orders are delivered to one location (home, office, store) then the group qualifies for a cooperative buying discount of 10% off the price of a weekly produce subscription. DTD delivers to Stapleton every Tuesday of the year and there are no commitments to service. For more information or to sign-up, visit www.doortodoororganics.com or call 303-297-3636. 



Police Academy Parcel

Many Stapleton residents have asked for an update regarding the Denver Police Academy Parcel of land located just east of Central Park Boulevard and Montview. The Denver Police Department is currently studying what their requirements are and whether a new facility up near I-70 should be a multi-jurisdictional facility. As a result, a move would be at least two years out.

The present parcel was purchased by the City and so they may decide to hold on to it for a use of their own (consistent with zoning, of course). If Forest City is able to purchase the parcel from the city, it would likely be for mixed use development. However, it is still too early to tell what will happen with the land until the Denver Police Department determines its needs. Rocky Mountain Arsenal Wildlife Refuge

Native Prairie Restoration Helped by Burns

Prescribed burns will be conducted on roughly 1,800 acres of the Rocky Mountain Arsenal National Wildlife Refuge this year to stimulate plant growth in reseeded areas.

"Prescribed burns help with native prairie restoration and improve the land for plant and wildlife habitat," said Lorenz Sollmann, refuge operations specialist and fire management officer for the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service.

Since 1997, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service has restored thousands of acres of land through prescribed burns and other methods. Burns spur native plant growth by recycling nutrients and eliminating foreign vegetation. A wellestablished land management tool, agricultural burns have been done since the early 1900s to clear irrigation ditches, improve pasture and remove litter from crop fields.

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service plans its burns all year and generally conducts them from March to May and September to November. Little to no burning takes place in the summer, which is wildlife nesting season.

The burns take place only during favorable weather conditions that meet set safety standards. As in previous years, the refuge will follow the state of Colorado smoke permit requirements and involve highly trained firefighters to ensure safety and control at all times.

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service provides advance notice to the public about intended burns through several media channels. For more information about prescribed burns at the Rocky Mountain Arsenal National Wildlife Refuge, contact Supervisory Park Ranger Sherry James at 303-289-0659.

Mulch Giveaway and Compost Sale

Denver Recycles/Solid Waste Management and Denver Parks and Recreation will host this year's annual Treecycle Mulch Giveaway and Leafdrop Compost Sale on **Saturday**, **May 6**, from 8 am to 3 pm. Free mulch will be available at five locations throughout the city, including Fred Thomas Park at Quebec & and 26th Ave., while Leafdrop Compost will be sold only at the main Havana Nursery, conveniently located to Stapleton at 10450 Smith Road, two blocks south of I-70 on Havana.

The mulch is made by grinding more than 19,000 Christmas trees collected by Denver Public Works/Solid Waste Management this past holiday season. Mulch is made of ground wood chips and is generally used as a top dressing for soil around trees and plants. It helps control weeds, helps soil to retain moisture and protects shallow-rooted plants from weather extremes. The Treecycle Mulch is **FREE** and available to Denver residents on a first-come-first served basis. Loader service for trucks and trailers will only be available at the Havana Nursery site.

Compost is a nutrient-rich soil amendment made from decomposed organic materials such as leaves and grass. It resembles soil and it can be mixed into soil to help reduce water and fertilizer needs or spread thinly over the lawn to fertilize and help grass roots retain moisture. Compost can retain 100% of its weight in water and is an important component of gardening in a drought. Leafdrop compost is made from more than 200 tons of leaves collected from Denver residents last fall. Compost will be sold for \$2 per 10-gallon bag (about 40 pounds), or \$28.50 per cubic yard with loader service (for open trailers and pick-ups). Sales tax

will be added to the prices noted. A standard full size pick-up bed holds about 2 1/2 cubic yards.

Xcel Energy Announces Solar Rewards Program

If you have ever considered installing a solar photovoltaic system on your house, you now have one more reason to do so! Xcel Energy recently announced details for their new Solar Rewards program. The Xcel Energy Solar

Rewards program is a result of the passage of Amendment 37 last fall, which requires Colorado's utility companies to provide a percentage of their retail electricity sales from renewable resources.

The Solar Rewards rebate, or Solar Rebate Offer (SRO), for qualifying photovoltaic equipment is a one-time payment up to \$4.50 per

watt for installations up to 10 kW (10,000 watts). The SRO has two components: the rebate and the Renewable Energy Credit (REC). The rebate is now set at \$2.00 per watt. The Renewable Energy Credit is \$2.50 per

watt. The Renewable Energy Credit is \$2.50 per watt, but may be adjusted accordingly if your system is expected to produce less than 90 percent or more than 110 percent of the annual energy production achieved under optimal conditions at your location.

The advantages of photovoltaic systems are that they are quiet and produce clean energy with no emissions. Installing one kilowatt of solar power is the equivalent of planting 50 trees. For each one kilowatt-hour of installed solar generation compared to fossil fuel generation, our environment will see 1,911 fewer pounds per year of carbon dioxide and six fewer pounds of nitrogen. Photovoltaic systems help reduce pollution, stabilize your electric costs, lessen dependence on fossil fuels, increase self-reliance and sustainability, preserve natural resources, and strengthen energy security.

Denver Water Launches Residential Rebate Programs

Denver Water recently announced rebates for residential customers interested in improving high water use appliances or adding efficiency enhancers to their irrigation systems. The rebates will be available all year, for purchases made between January 1, 2006, and December 31, 2006. Highlights of Denver Water's rebate program include:

- A \$200 rebate to homeowners who purchase a qualifying high-efficiency clothes washer.
- A \$150 rebate for the purchase and installation of an ET (Evapotranspiration) Controller.
- A \$25 rebate for the purchase and installation of a rain sensor.

Evapotranspiration, or ET, is the combination of water that is lost from the soil through evaporation and through transpiration from plants as a part of their metabolic processes. An ET Controller uses data received from its own sensors and/or local weather stations and automatically decreases or increases the irrigation schedule according to current changes in the weather.


Rain sensor devices automatically shut off sprinkler systems during and after rain showers, and allow the system to go back to their normal cycles once the sensor dries out. These devices save tremendous amounts of otherwise waste irrigation water.



Keeping Pets Healthy

Why Is My Pet Overweight? What Can I Do About It?

Is your pet overweight? Check these things: Can you feel her ribs? Can you feel her back bone? Is there a nice, feminine curve to her waist? Can she get up easily? Can she exercise as much as she wants to? If the answers to these questions is generally "no," then your pet may be obese. For a final determination, consult your veterinarian.

The health risks to overweight dogs and cats are high. There is a severely increased risk of arthritis and other degenerative orthopedic disorders. There is also an increased risk of mammary cancer later in life (in female dogs) as well as other sorts of cancers such as cystic transitional cell carcinomas and osteosarcomas (bone cancer). Dogs and cats who are overweight also do not exercise as much, cannot tolerate heat as well, and also show earlier signs of aging versus ideal weight individuals. In addition, veterinarians will also see problems breathing, heart problems, and skin problems.

The cause of obesity is usually very simple. More calories are being ingested versus what is being burned. Therefore, the solution is usually very simple. Feed less food and get more exercise. My recommendations for food are simple as well: feed a high quality dog or cat food, and restrict table scraps to fresh or cooked vegetables, boiled rice, boiled hamburger, or boiled chicken (for dogs), or give small amounts of chicken, fish, or beef to cats as treats. Naturally, you can still feed too much of a good thing, so exercise is part of the program (as well as feeding less food overall). I usually tell my clients that the best exercise for loosing calories is a twenty to thirty minute walk at a brisk pace. Your dog will burn the most calories if she does this after a twelve hour fast, so a morning walk before breakfast is absolutely the best way to burn the most calories. Unfortunately, there is simply no way to take cats for a brisk morning walk, however, providing opportunities for play can increase their activity levels.

Beware that there are certain hormone problems that can cause obesity as well. Consult your veterinarian about testing for such diseases as hypothyroidism, Cushing's disease, and others.

Finally, food quality can have a lot to do with weight. Without endorsing any specific brand of cat or dog food, it can be safely said that good foods simply cost more. If you want to tell if the food you're purchasing is high or low quality, then check the price. If you're paying more, then it's a better food. Also, dogs and cats can benefit from additional fiber in their diets. Fiber will fill them up without increasing caloric intake. Good sources of fiber for dogs and cats include fresh packed pumpkin in a can, or low fat bran muffins for dogs (no raisins or nuts please—these can be potentially harmful). Cats may benefit from increased protein levels such as may be found in certain kitten foods, but this is somewhat controversial.

In conclusion, obesity that you simply cannot control is a good reason to visit your veterinarian. There could be a disease process lurking beneath the surface, but more likely, your veterinarian can work with you to provide a safe and effective weight loss program.

I clean, therefore I am. That means floors, windows, walls, with special emphasis on the kitchen and bathrooms. In a nutshell: if your home appears dirty, a buyer could likely interpret your home preparation habits to your home maintenance habits.

Understate your artistic flair.
Don't overdo deep paint colors, wallpaper borders, stencils and faux finishes. You'll do better with simple earth tones that match your furniture and décor. Temporarily replace any type of inflammatory or controversial art pieces with something

neutral, like a landscape. The same goes

with extremely religious and political

artifacts

Clear the decks. Kitchen & bathroom countertops should be relatively bare. Put away the toaster, the blender, the sugar canisters & your liquor collection. Be especially tidy in the bathroom; people get really weird about hair, toothbrushes and

Follow the light. Keep window blinds & drapes open at all times; natural light is a fantastic benefit that buyers will notice.

spotty toilets & tub/showers.

Be invisible. Remove personal photos and replace with minimal decorative objects. Remember to group in three's. The experience for the buyer should highlight the home, not the people who live there.

Pet-B-Gone. Keep your dogs off the property during showings if possible. If you have animals who are strictly indoor pets, post an

explicit note right on the front door so buyers know that Miss Kitty stays in.

Don't be a stinker. A smell of clean is a good thing, so is a candle scented with cinnamon. Don't go heavy on room deodorizers since it might make the buyer think you are trying to mask something.

Go ahead, be compulsive. A home that is organized speaks well of the seller. Neatly stacked boxes, smartly organized garages & basements show that the seller is "on top of it". When a seller "over prepares" to get their home in showing condition, they will only benefit from their efforts

Sarah's April Gardening Tips:

Lawns: Aerate, water only if weather is warm and dry, fertilize only if spring green-up and growth are unsatisfactory. Reseed bare spots.

Weeds: Hand pull or spot treat emerging weeds.

Trees and Shrubs: Remove tree wrap from young trees. Plant new trees and shrubs now or later in the spring.

Perennials: Water perennial beds if weather is dry. Remove winter mulch and prune dead foliage. Top-dress with 2-3 inches of compost. Begin planting new perennials by mid-month.

Annuals: Start shopping for annual plants. Do not set out frost-sensitive annuals or vegetables until after last average frost date of May 15th.

Seeds: Early in the month, start seeds that take six weeks to grow to transplant size. By late April you can start quick-growing annual and herb seeds indoors.

Family Kicks

Martial Arts - A Diversity Opportunity

In the past months, I have mostly talked about kids and karate (martial arts). This month I want to talk about adults, martial arts, and the benefits of doing martial arts. I say, training in Martial Arts is exercising with a purpose.

What does that really mean? Well... we can go to the gym and lift weights, run on the treadmill to get "into the zone" and get fit and stay healthy and look good. Some



of us are training with specific goals, like a race or weight lifting event or ski race. You have a set mission, and the mission is to be ready for that event (for myself, this primarily involves martial arts tournaments). However, what martial arts can do for you is give you a day, a week, a month, or lifetime of missions. In most martial arts, there are belts and ranks to strive for as a mission. Now every 2-3 months, you are going to change rank or belt, if you are active in your karate school, depending on the style of martial arts in which you are training. Let's look at some choices you might have in styles of martial arts, depending on where

First off, let me tell you that not all karate schools teach "karate." Americans tend to use this word as a catch-all for every martial arts style. The truth is, the styles of martial arts are quite different.

Karate means "Way of the Empty Hand," and is a Japanese style of self defense and sport. In karate, emphasis is 50% upon punches, 50% upon kicks. Further defining this style are low stances, strong linear movement, a level of throwing and grappling, optimizing force against force, what is called "hard style" movement, and a degree of weapons training Karate provides a high impact workout.

Tae Kwon Do, "Way of the Foot and Hand," is a Korean style martial art and sport. It is athletically based with high kicking and vigorous drills for perfecting kicking, skills. In Tae Kwan Do, emphasis is 70% upon kicks, and 30% upon punches. Again, force against force is optimized and some degree of weapons training involved. This is hard style martial arts with a fairly high impact workout. You may have seen Tae Kwon Do on television, since it is an Olympic event.

Kung Fu means "Skilled Worker," and is an ancient Chinese Martial Art form. The modern component, Wu Shu, is the sport aspect of Kung Fu. Kung Fu uses the movement of many animals and insects to influence martial effectiveness. The percent of application of hands and feet varies depending on specific style of Kung Fu which is different if originating from northern China, for example, where the style emphasizes high kicking. Southern styles, on the other hand, emphasize advanced hand techniques. Overall, Kung Fu is characterized by flowing movement that takes an attacker's energy and turns it back upon him. Multiple weapons are taught as part of Kung Fu, along with meditation exercises. This style of martial arts is considered a soft style, with a moderate to high impact workout.

Kempo, or "Fist Law," is an American/Chinese, Japanese/Chinese and Okinawan martial arts derivative using 60% hand strike skills and 40% kicks, some of which are high and so require flexibility. Kempo is the first recognized American martial art based on self-defense, and is quite eclectic in approach: elements of the other forms can be seen in a combination of flowing movement, hard and soft styles, and the imitation of animals or insects both for self defense and psychological effect against an

There are many more martial arts styles, such as Capoeria, Aikido, Judo, Jujitsu, and Cardio Kickboxing. The point is this: there is a style that will fit the purpose of the level of exercise you want to achieve. If you want a workout that constantly challenges you, helps you set goals, is never boring, and delivers realizations to refresh your body, mind and spirit, then Martial Arts is an amazingly diverse opportunity. You not only learn to stay in shape for the rest of your life, but you can defend yourself and your loved ones in case of the unexpected event of violence against you or someone you love. And you can get in touch with your Spirit in a way that will change your life forever.

Eat Good Food

California Roll in a Bowl or "You-name-it" in a Bow

This winter I discovered what I believe is Stapleton's hidden jewel: The Phoenix Yoga Studio in Town Center. I had done yoga over the past two decades a middling amount from college where I practiced in a lobby of a local theatre to my early working life doing it in a sterile gymnasium to prenatal yoga in a fancy, overpriced, tv-blaring, iron-body-type sports club. None of these places ever made yoga more than another form of ho-hum exercise. And then one day in mid-December I walked into Phoenix Yoga for my first class and walked out profoundly changed. The serenity of the light-filled, mellow, peach and lilac toned walls enveloped me as I sank clumsily into one pose after another. Unlike other yoga I had done, the peace and clarity present in Phoenix Yoga is powerful. It came as a needed respite from the nonstop chattering of children, the endless drone of neighbors asking "so, who's your builder?!", the ringing of the phone, etc. I'm still as lost and often quite clumsy as I attempt my practice, but I've found my oasis in Stapleton.

And as millions of others before have found that the more you practice yoga, the more your body wants to do anything it can to assist the process. One of those things is eating lighter. I'm not talking about a fruit-only diet or anything extreme, just simply becoming more conscious of the food we put in our body and how it affects us. A few months ago, pre-yoga conversion, I created this meal that we now have on average twice a week in our house. I call it California Roll in a Bowl or Cucumber Roll in a Bowl or Shrimp Roll in a Bowl - you get the picture. And, although I'm 100% certain that I'm not the first to have thought of this easy-Japanese style dinner, I am certain that I have created a new standard of comfort food for my family.

One of my other latest conversions has been to the world of rice cookers. I always thought they were only for serious Asian food lovers/cooks, but what I found was that it's an amazing time-saving device that produces incredible rice every time. If you can, check out the Asian supermarkets on Federal or go to Han Au Rheum in Aurora to not only get a great deal, but also to pick up some basic "____ in a Bowl" staples at half the price of the fancy gourmet/natural food stores.

Basic Recipe for California Roll in a Bowl

2 cups brown rice

4 oz. steamed shrimp, salmon, crab

or tofu (or none at all)

2 sheets nori 2 tablespoons toasted sesame seeds

1/2 cucumber, diced

1/2 carrot, grated or julienned 1/2 avocado, diced Pickled ginger Wasabi Soy Sauce

Sesame oil

To Prepare: In two soup or cereal bowls divide rice equally. Divide protein, if using, on top of rice. Top with cucumber, carrot, and avocado, equally divided. Crumble one nori sheet and sprinkle sesame seeds over everything. Serve with pickled ginger, wasabi and soy sauce.

Staples to purchase at Asian supermarkets: large bags of rice (I recently got a 10lb bag of brown rice for only \$7), nori sheets, sesame seeds, wasabi, pickled ginger, soy sauce, sesame oil. If you have all of these things in your cupboard you are more than half of the way to having "____ in a Bowl" nearly any night of the week.

And lastly, why brown rice? Here's the skinny: Compared to enriched, processed white rice, unenriched, unprocessed brown rice has 349% more fiber, 203% more Vitamin E, 185% more B6 and 219% more magnesium and 19% more protein.

'Nuf said?

Fortunately, we as a neighborhood can take an active role: implementing community policing techniques that involve working hand in hand with one another and the DPD. Community policing and neighborhood watch have effectively reduced crime on participating blocks, and can be rapidly applied to make your block safer.

Report All Crimes to Direct Limited City Resources


Numerous crimes, particularly theft of items from garages and porches, have gone unreported. Reporting crimes or attempted crimes immediately is crucial for at least three reasons: (1) you give the DPD the chance to arrive on the scene - even if they do not catch the perpetrators, their arrival will deter future crime, (2) crime statistics compiled from your reports allow the DPD to spot trends and direct police resources accordingly, and (3) complete reporting of all crimes is necessary for DPD District 2 to obtain necessary resources from the City in an extremely challenging budgetary environment.



Community Policing/Neighborhood Watch: Low Cost, High Yield

Even with unlimited resources, the most effective policing

programs are those in which neighbors take an active and collaborative approach, working with their local officers in a model known as "community policing." Because neighbors knowing and looking out for their fellow neighbors drives any successful community policing program, residents attending training sessions are organized on a blockby-block basis. As part of the program, Neighborhood Liaison Officers Michael Rappe and Reyes Trujillo provide training on personal safety and crime prevention, and each household receives a copy of the Denver Police Department's Crime Prevention Manual, which contains valuable tips on self defense, protecting your home, preventing auto theft,



child safety, discouraging burglars, and reporting crime. Blocks that achieve substantial participation in the community policing training and registration will become part of the Denver Neighborhood Watch program. Among other benefits, the program includes the posting of Neighborhood Watch signs, which have had a proven effect in deterring crime. While over 370 homes have participated in the program and over 25 Stapleton blocks have achieved "Neighborhood Watch" status, Stapleton continues to grow and therefore we will need more participation to maximize safety.



Our photographer catches the demolition of an old hotel at 36th and Quebec. A new retail center is planned for that location.






