's it possible for humans, nature, business, and development to co-exist? The answer is a resounding – yes! The Sand Creek Regional Greenway Partnership, the cities of Aurora, Commerce City and Denver, Stapleton Development Corporation, many businesses and individual partners are currently rising to this modern-day challenge.

Just fifteen years ago, this area was an airport with no parks or trails. Ten years ago, a group of visionaries saw that Sand Creek could be reclaimed as an urban greenway – some areas were already being used by hikers (as shown above). Five years ago, though the trail was not "complete," sections were officially

opened to allow people to discover this beautiful natural area in an urban setting.

During these last five years, incredible progress has been made along the Greenway. The final off-road section of the nearly 14-mile trail was completed, three new parks were opened, a new nature center was built, and many off-road links with regional trails were completed.

The next five years promise to be equally exciting. In the works are two more major parks, a new trailhead, paved trails next to the existing soft-surface trails in Denver, and recovery of more native habitat for our local wildlife.

The Sand Creek Regional Greenway was named by the American Hiking Society as one of the Top Ten Fitness Trails in the USA; and it won the coveted Starburst Award for best use of Colorado Lottery funds; (continued on page 7)







The Citizen's Advisory Board of the Stapleton Development Corporation — Who We Are, What We Do, and How You Can Get Involved

he Citizens Advisory Board (CAB) was appointed by the Mayor of Denver in early 1993. It was established to be involved in the redevelopment activities including the creation of the Development Plan for Stapleton. The initial Board included 42 members who represented a variety of perspectives and constituencies, including business, neighborhood and professional associations. (Stapleton Development Plan, *The Green Book*, March 1995)

The mission of the Citizens Advisory Board is to provide input from a broad spectrum of interests in the community to the Stapleton Development Corporation (SDC) regarding the planning and development

process for the redevelopment of the former Stapleton International Airport.

The role of CAB is to advise the Stapleton Development Corporation Board and Staff on matters relating to the development of Stapleton from a community and citizen's point of view; to represent the views of constituent groups for officially designated by organizations; to support efforts to inform the community at large about progress at Stapleton.

Members are responsible for regularly attending and actively participating in CAB meetings; participating on at least one of the active CAB committees or another Stapleton related committee; annually disclosing information under the Conflict of Interest Policy; and assisting with a Stapleton presentation to at least one community group each year.

Currently the Citizens Advisory Board is made up of a group of individuals representing a broad cross section of the community from residents of Stapleton, surrounding neighborhoods and the community at large. The CAB is lead by co-chairs, Elizabeth Garner, a resident of Stapleton and myself, a Denver area Landscape Architect. The CAB is organized into several sub-committees that meet individually to consider specific issues as determined by the sub-committee, the CAB and the community at large. The sub-committees include: Membership, Housing Diversity, Work Force and Business Opportunity, Parks Advisory Group, Zoning and

Planning Group, Transportation Group, and the Communication Committee.

Each subcommittee meets regularly to address the various aspects of the greater Stapleton complex as they relate to the CAB, the Stapleton Development Corporation and the community at large. They then report back to the CAB as a whole each month to provide information, direction and recommendations. Future editions of the Front Porch will include information about these subcommittees and projects they are working on.

The CAB meeting agenda is developed by the CAB Co-chairs. Topics or issues to be covered at the meeting are requested throughout the year. Members, organiza-

tions or groups are encouraged to submit topics or issues to the co-chairs as they come up and prior to the second week of the month if the topic is to be listed on the agenda.

A public comment section of the agenda is set aside to hear questions, concerns or comments from the public. Each person requesting to speak must sign in and provide contact information to the CAB prior to the Public Comment time period. Each person will have three minutes to speak. Depending on the comment or issue it could be either answered directly at the meeting or the issue assigned to a sub-committee or Forest City for further consideration. A written report to CAB is submitted by the next meeting indicating how it has been resolved. If the issue is not resolved and no further action can be taken by CAB, CAB will refer the issue to the SDC for resolution.

The regular monthly meeting of the Citizens Advisory Board is held the third Thursday of each month from 7:30 am to 9:00 am. The meeting is typically held at the Stapleton Development corporation offices at 7350 East 29th Avenue in Suite 300. Cycling Through Stapleton

ith Denver becoming more bicycle friendly each year, it's no surprise that the 2007 Bike To Work Day was a huge success. The Bike to Work Day event has been growing in participation since 1956 when the state of Colorado announced the event to take place every fourth Wednesday in June. This year about 15,444 people registered with 5,738 being first time participants. An estimated 21-23,000 people got on their bikes this time around – a 12% increase from last year's 17,000.

For the last five years, the Stapleton Transportation Management Association has teamed up with Denver Regional Council of Regional Governments (DRCOG), to promote bicycling in and around Stapleton. The Stapleton Area TMA has hosted a breakfast station at King Soopers on 28th and Quebec for 5 years, and has expanded to another station at Perk Hill Coffee House located on 22nd and Kearney for the third time. With each event becoming more and more popular, the breakfast stations hosted by the TMA are working to transform the stations into mini bike fairs, and free bicycle tune-ups for participants. Bikers commuting from all over the Metro area have stopped by the breakfast stations year after year for the free breakfast, drawings, and giveaways such as the bicycle balloon hats given to every participant this year.

Each year, the Stapleton Area TMA breakfast station's level of participation has risen and has become more of an annual community event at Stapleton with bikers eagerly looking forward to future Bike to Work Days. Out of the 150 bikers at the two Stapleton TMA hosted stations, Stapleton resident Lisa Digan was the lucky winner of a brand new Fuji mountain bike. With 2.6 million driving miles saved on Bike to Work Day alone, we are hoping that this year's event gave participants motivation to use alternative modes of transportation more frequently in the future. The Stapleton TMA consistently promotes bicycling and other alternative modes of transportation in and around Stapleton in an effort to make the area more bicycle friendly, and has many volunteer opportunities for people who would like to help with biking activities coming up throughout the year.

Since You've Asked...

Does anyone know anything about DPS plans to force Stapleton Kindergartners to attend elementary schools in Northeast Park Hill? This seems to be the direction in which the survey in this month's (June 2007) Front Porch Newsletter was heading. If DPS eliminates the boundaries for Westerly Creek and Bill Roberts, will these schools fill up and reject new students from Stapleton? Will this force kids into non-Stapleton schools?

Stapleton students will not be forced to attend schools outside of their enrollment area. There is more than enough school space capacity at Stapleton now and in the future to accommodate resident needs. Denver Public Schools policy gives Stapleton residents first preference to attend schools within their enrollment boundaries. Westerly Creek Elementary and the William Roberts ECE-8 school do not have separate boundaries. The boundaries for Westerly Creek and Roberts are all of Stapleton to the corner of Montview Boulevard & Quebec St.

The projected growth of any enrollment area in the city over time dictates how many students may "choice in" to that school. ("Choice-in students" are those who live outside a school's attendance area.) The option to "choice in" to a Stapleton school is limited given the steady growth in schoolage children in Stapleton over the past few years and what is anticipated in the future. Planners for Denver Public Schools and Stapleton school principals weigh the needs of residents before accepting choice students.

DPS expects the space available in Westerly Creek and Roberts to accommodate student growth for the next two to three years in ways that are best for their academic programs. A third ECE-8 school is tentatively planned to open in 2009-2010; that date is contingent on actual enrollment trends and the availability of bond money. DPS and the Stapleton Foundation are assessing the needs in central northeast Denver to help the community better plan for the future. The recent questionnaire was meant to gauge attitudes about variations on current choice policies. There are no plans to alter choice policies that would eliminate the current neighborhood school assignment practice and resident preference.

What's the status of the park that runs along 26th from Clinton to Havana?

The City and County of Denver has begun environmental remediation on the parcel of land that will eventually be transferred to the Park Creek Metropolitan District. The park is currently expected to be open to the public in late 2009, but that is contingent upon the City of Denver's completion of remediation, entitlements, construction and the market demand for housing at Stapleton.

I am still not satisfied that the new town center may be quite expensive. Northfield restaurants are generally far more expensive than the old town center. You talk a good line about affordable housing but (the affordable for-sale homes) will not be served by the town center nearest them if it's like Northfield. Please include a couple of restaurants priced like Noodles and Udi's and supermarket that is not so upscale beyond King Soopers.

Forest City strives to attract retail to Stapleton that serves the widest possible range of household incomes. We are negotiating with more than one potential grocery store for the Eastbridge Town Center that will open in late 2008 at Martin Luther King Boulevard and Geneva Court. That grocery store is expected to be smaller than the King Soopers that anchors the E. 29th Avenue Town Center.

What is the status of the air traffic control tower?

The former air traffic control tower has been stabilized for some future use yet to be determined. See the May 2007 Stapleton Front Porch ("Control Tower a Monument to Stapleton's Past") for more information about the tower.

What are the plans for the lot east of Digstown (Doggie Day Care Center)?

That parcel of land is zoned for Mixed Use development that could include residential and commercial uses or a civic use such as a church that are consistent with the Stapleton Development Plan. That portion of Stapleton already includes Hangar 61, which is being redeveloped for office uses.

Why must green space be watered during daylight hours? This is wasteful as evaporation results in greater water loss during the day.

Several entities oversee management of Stapleton's 'green space' including Denver Parks and Recreation, the Stapleton Master Community Association (MCA) and the Park Creek Metropolitan District. The MCA manages all in-tract parkland including the various mini-parks distributed throughout the Stapleton community.

Currently, Denver Parks and Recreation (DPR) owns, and is exclusively responsible for maintaining Greenway Park. DPR's irrigation controllers at Greenway Park are scheduled to run from 10:00 at night until about 8 or 9 in the morning on Monday, Tuesday, Thursday, and Saturday since the temperatures have been so high. Normally, Parks staff operates these controllers only three nights per week. DPR also supplements the night time watering in isolated dry spots until 10:00 a.m. if needed. If irrigation water is running after 10:00 a.m., Parks staff is performing zone checks and/or making repairs to the irrigation system. The Department of Parks and Recreation does expect contractors working on Park projects to follow the Department's watering window, however, exceptions can be granted for additional watering during a landscape establishment period.

Although Westerly Creek has been turned over to City of Denver ownership, part of the area remains under a maintenance contract managed by Park Creek Metropolitan District (Park Creek) in which contractors are responsible for irrigation.

Central Park is under construction so contractors will be watering throughout the day in order to promote establishment of the park's landscape. Central Park construction is managed by Park Creek and will not be turned over to the City of Denver until construction is complete and accepted by the City.


Are there plans to install photo-radar devices along Central Park, 29th Avenue and MLK? Too many people ignore the speed limits. A child is bound to be injured, sooner or later!

The Stapleton Master Community Association and the Stapleton Transportation Management Association have purchased a mobile speed monitoring radar trailer that is moved throughout Stapleton to identify streets where speeding has become a problem and therefore special enforcement by the Denver Police Department is required through the issuance of speeding tickets. Both Central Park and Martin Luther King boulevards have been and will continue to be monitored through that process.

We would like the market-rate apartments (planned for the Eastbridge Town Center) to be shorter (fewer stories) than the ones in E. 29th Ave. Town Centre. We live behind the future apartments and don't want apartments towering over

The E. 29th Avenue Town Center is a mixture of 4, 3, and 2 story buildings whereas the new Eastbridge Town Center will be a mixture of 3 and 2 story buildings with the buildings closest to the single family residential orientated to be perpendicular, not parallel to those homes. The buildings in Eastbridge will generally be shorter than those in the E. 29th Avenue Town Center due to the mix of buildings and flat roof design.

t. Therese Catholic Grade School has been educating children in an Aurora neighborhood just south of Stapleton for more than fifty years, a contribution that was recently acknowledged by the City when it bestowed Historic Landmark status on the school of 200 students at 1200 Kenton Street.

As much as Laura Dement, principal of St. Therese, appreciates the historic honor, her attention is turned to the future and the opportunity to provide children enrolled in Pre-K (4 year olds) through 8th grade with what she describes as "a safe, nurturing environment with high academic standards." The school has a core curriculum of language arts, mathematics, science, social studies and religion which is enhanced by music, art, physical education and computer lab instruction. St. Therese is a member of the Catholic Schools Athletic League which enables boys and girls in grades three through eight to participate in basketball and volleyball. The school also has a baseball program for boys.

Colorado Free University

A Local Gem in Adult Education

In 1987, Denver native and child of the '60s John Hand created a legacy. A key force in the running of Denver Free University during the mid-70s, John went on to create Colorado Free University (CFU). "John based CFU on the premise that adults should be able to direct their own learning and that communities have within them the resources to solve their own problems," says Helen Hand, John's sister and the current President of CFU. "He believed that the community is strengthened when people with expert-

ise and passion have a place to share their ideas and skills with others who have an interest in learning or a need to grow."

Now one of the few and largest independent education centers in the US and Canada, CFU has grown from offering just a few courses to about 450 courses in each catalog. "I get calls all the time from people who have moved from Denver asking if I know of a CFU-like institution in their location," says Helen. "They don't realize until they leave what a gem CFU is."

Helen is proud of the vast diversity of courses offered at CFU. Among the largest is the

Spanish language program, with classes offered at various times of the day and days of the week. Also popular are the computer classes run through the Compuskills Computer Center. A wide range of classes for professional and personal purposes – everything from basic computer skills to Quickbooks to web design – are offered.

Other popular classes are organized in the categories of Career, Business and Finance; Arts, Recreation and Entertainment; Tasting, Cooking and On The Town; Lifeskills, Relationships and Personal Growth; Meditation, Yoga, Wellness and Metaphysics; and Family Friendly and Pets.

"Our students are as diverse as our offerings," Helen says. "You'll find a 26-year-old in class with a 73-year-old and a person with post-graduate degrees sitting next to a high school graduate. The thing that all of our students have in common is initiative and independent-mindedness. We don't offer certificates or degrees—people take classes for their own learning or enrichment. Our students are people who are

ready to take control of their lives, to step out of their comfort zone to try something new, or just have more fun."

In March of 2004, John was tragically killed, but his legacy continues under the leadership of his sister Helen. "I am a clinical psychologist and have had a practice for over 25 years," Helen says. "When John died, I cut back my psychology practice in order to become the president of Colorado Free University. I joined a dedicated, competent staff that was determined to keep the school going. The learning curve has been very steep for me, but I have become pas-

sionate about the school and am driven to keep CFU as a resource for the Front Range community."

Classes are described in the 10 catalogs a year CFU publishes. They do not follow academic terms but have continuous classes ranging in price from \$19 to about \$150. The goal of CFU is to make learning affordable, accessible, practical and convenient for adults. "I hear stories all the time," Helen says, "about how people made career changes, met a future partner, got the skills to start their own business, mas-

tered Spanish, developed untapped talents, or made a breakthrough in communication skills."


CFU has two primary locations: their original location at Colfax and York, which houses their administrative offices and computer center; and their Lowry location at 1st and Quebec in the renovated Fire Station. CFU also has a classroom in the Denver Tech Center that Webster University allows them to use for some classes, and many other instructors hold classes in their own locations. CFU screens instructors to make sure they have the knowledge, communication skills and viable class plan to craft a course that will be of value to students.



held environmental education courses for over 20,000 students with our partners Aurora Parks and Open Space at the Morrison Nature Center and Bluff Lake Nature Center; and hosted thousands of visitors who bicycle, commute, run, stroll, picnic and bird watch along the Greenway.

If you have not yet discovered the Sand Creek Regional Greenway, summer and fall are perfect times to explore the trail – it is a great living classroom for children and adults. Along the trail there are many points of interest to visit and enjoy. From the Morrison Nature Center at Star K Ranch, to Bluff Lake Nature Preserve to the Commerce City Wet-

land Park – there is a lot to discover. Around any bend, you may spot the lovable and excitable mud swallows (which build mud nests under bridges), foxes, hawks, fish fry, egrets, eagles and many more critters that have recently returned to the area to live in their natural habitat.


Human visitors have also become greenway denizens, taking advantage of the now accessible and convenient trail used for bike commuting, exercise and recreation. Cooking Up Fun

Ahhh Summer...one of my favorite things about this time of year is all of the farmers markets around town. These summer establishments are meccas for the freshest ingredients and offer a great opportunity to support our hard-working farmers and local businesses. We are very lucky to have the Stapleton Farmers Market right here in our own backyard. If you haven't already, check it out every Sunday morning starting at 9:00am at the East 29th Avenue Town Center.

August is the perfect time of year to buy the best peppers, sweet corn, tomatoes, peaches, plums, and melons. But today's farmers markets offer much more than just locally grown produce; be adventurous and try the culinary herbs, fresh cheeses, baked goods and other gourmet food items. Talk to the vendors, many of them are the farmers themselves, and ask for recipe ideas using seasonal ingredients or their favorite items – they are always more than willing to help. I did just that and discovered a new way to spice up an old favorite – quesadillas.

Farmers Market Quesadillas

Start with fresh homemade tortillas (available at almost every farmers market in town) and load them up with local natural goat cheese, grilled seasonal vegetables (e.g., red bell pepper, poblano pepper – char and peel before eating, red onion, yellow squash, and eggplant), and top with fresh salsa.

To make the salsa, combine one diced red onion, four fresh diced tomatoes (try a couple different varieties like Big Beef, Early Girl, or Yellow Beefsteak), 1 minced serrano pepper, 2 fresh minced jalapeno peppers, 3 minced cloves of garlic, a squeeze of lime, and a pinch of fresh

cilantro. Season to taste with salt and pepper.

Take two fresh tortillas and brush with olive oil. Next, crumble on the goat cheese and add the grilled vegetables, a healthy portion of salsa, and another layer of cheese. Grill on high heat (oiled side down) for 4 minutes, flip and grill another 3. Remove from heat, slice and serve with additional salsa for dipping and slices of fresh avocado and lime wedges.

The spicy quesadillas pair nicely with another of my farmers market favorites summer corn bisque.

Summer Corn Bisque

To prepare this fantastic summer soup, you will need to begin by making a corn stock. Take 6 ears fresh corn and cut the corn off of the cob - save cobs. Place in a large stock pot and add 1 gallon of water, 2 bay leaves, a dozen or so black peppercorns, and a pinch of salt. Bring to a rolling boil and reduce to a simmer for 30 minutes. Allow this mixture to cool for 30 minutes and remove the corn cobs, peppercorns, and bay leaves. Ladle the corn stock into a heavy duty blender, half full, and puree. Pass this mixture through a fine strainer and discard the remaining corn pulp. Repeat until all of your stock is pureed. Bring the stock back up to low heat and slowly add 1 pint of heavy cream to thicken (more or less to your desired thickness). Season with salt and pepper to taste. Allow to simmer for 15 minutes and garnish with salsa or avocado oil immediately before serving.




Volunteers Needed to Record for the Blind & Dyslexic

Grape Seeds Show Potential in Fighting Cancer

A common theme continues to develop in cancer research; a concept that is far from new: eat your fruits and vegetables.

Chapla Agarwal, PhD, assistant research professor at the University of Colorado at Denver and Health Sciences Center's School of Pharmacy, recently received a five year, \$1.9 million National Institutes of Health grant to study the effects of grape seed extract on colorectal cancer. She believes it may become a major factor in the prevention or treatment of cancer.

"Our aim is to basically extract the grape seed, see how concentrated it is, observe how the cancer acts in the body and see how we can use the grape seed extract against the cancer. I don't know if it can cure the cancer, but it could help prevent people who are at high risk for colon cancer from developing the disease," Agarwal said.

Grape seeds are rich in antioxidants, which act as inhibitors against the disease by scavenging the free radicals that can cause colorectal cancer. Agarwal's pre-clinical trials at the School of Pharmacy have shown success in treating induced tumors in mice models and treating them with grape seed extract. Further research still needs to be done before the findings are applied to human cancers.

The potential benefits are huge. "If you could prevent the cancer somewhere, or at least stop one stage of the cancer development, it would help control the disease," Agarwal said. "Chemopreventative agents, such as grape seed extract, can do this."

Prevention is the best form of treatment for cancer, and chemoprevention is a rapidly growing area in the field cancer research.

One of the major interests in Agarwal's research stems from the lack of side effects from grape seed extract compared to other forms of cancer treatment.

"A promising element of studies so far is that, the mice haven't shown toxicity to very high doses of the extract. That's amazing, because toxicity is the main problem with the current cancer drugs and their side effects. Many people die, not from the cancer itself, but because of side effects from the treatment. That's why this natural product research is good," Agarwal said.

The antioxidants can be found in all forms of grapes, but they are especially prevalent in red grapes with seeds. Because the entire grape is used in the process of making wine, red wine is a good source of the antioxidants found in grape seeds.

Through the grant she received, Agarwal has been dedicating her research to the effects of grape seed extract on colorectal cancer, however, she believes it may also affect other forms of cancer, such as prostate, skin and breast cancers.

There is still a significant amount of research to do before any conclusions can be made, but Agarwal thinks grape seed extract has a lot of potential for the future of cancer treatment, "I think it will take my whole research career; there's a lot we don't know. Maybe it will take over as the main form of cancer treatment. That's what I want, but we haven't reached that point yet."

For now, she says, people should focus on eating fruits and vegetables.

Local Adoptees V

he story of adoption is an ongoing one, with new perspectives gained as the adopted child grows up and pieces together the different aspects of his or her life. This can be an especially long journey for children adopted from other countries who have experienced a radical change in culture and may know very little about their beginnings. The Front Porch spoke with two girls adopted from China – Tori Larson, almost 16 and a resident of Stapleton, and Lin Hill, now 15 and a resident of Park Hill – to ask about their experiences, their impressions looking back, and what advice they have for families in the process of adopting from other cultures.

At the age of almost 5 and almost 4, Tori and Lin were old enough to be aware of their adoption as it was happening. "I asked my nannies at the orphanage 'How long until they come?'" says Tori. "They were like 'Just 2 more weeks.' Then two weeks later I'd ask 'How much longer?' and they'd say 'Two more months.'" The delay resulted from restructuring in the Chinese bureaucracy and lost fingerprints in the US bureaucracy, but it's hard to explain that to a young child waiting to be adopted.

Tori and Lin were not in the same orphanage but have known each other since they were adopted. Their parents met through the adoption process and arranged with the adoption agency, Chinese Children Adoption International, to travel together for the adoption trip to China. Both families made their first trip back to China last year to show the girls their birthplace and see Chinese culture firsthand.

Both girls remembered their orphanages and were surprised and happy that their original caregivers remembered them all these years later. "Visiting my orphanage, I kind of felt like I was home," says Lin. "The director of my orphanage remembered me and started crying. It was just interesting to find out that she still thought about us and knew who I was. She still called me by my Chinese name."


In China, no information is available about the birth mother and family. The most an adoptive child may learn is where she was found. Tori and her family learned that Tori had been found as a 3-day-old infant in a cardboard box in a local market. While Tori's adoptive parents found visiting the site where she was found to be an emotional experience, Tori was not upset by it. "Maybe other people would think, 'Oh, my gosh, I was left here in a box in this market?'" she says. "But I didn't have any expectations. It didn't really shock me."

Tori and Lin loved their time in China but had feelings of being different than Chinese people. "It felt kind of weird because I'm Chinese but my culture is American," Tori recounts. "Most people could tell I was American by how I dressed and how I walked. And then when I didn't want to look American, I still had my parents walking with me." Lin agrees. "You'd walk in somewhere, and people would stare at you and stare at your parents. It was interesting to see how they reacted."

The families of both girls have made efforts to teach them about their native culture, including celebrating Chinese New Year, learning about the Chinese calendar and symbols, and attending a three-day Chinese Heritage Camp each summer for adoptees and their families. Despite these efforts, both girls report it wasn't enough to give them a strong connection to Chinese culture. Yet it's clear these experiences have made an impression, and they both plan to pursue future trips to their native land.

The Chinese Heritage Camp in particular has given them a sense of camaraderie with other kids adopted from China. "It's a way for





kids to learn about the culture and do activities that are related to the culture," Lin explains. "And then at middle school age, we talked about adoption and how it affected our lives, and how we felt different from everyone else. We get to hear how other people felt about being adopted and hear their stories. It's nice to be around other people who understand what you're going through."

Asked what advice they have for families adopting children from other countries, both girls recommend teaching children as much as possible about their native culture. "Don't shelter them from their culture," says Lin. "I think it's important they learn about it. Be open with them and tell them. I know my mom still tells me stories about my adoption." Tori also points out the importance of being partnered with other adoptees from the same country for a sense of companionship.

"One thing I think kids should know about being adopted is that you shouldn't be ashamed of who you are," says Lin. "You shouldn't be embarrassed about anything. You should be open with it. I know my friends are interested in it, and they want to know about it."

"Stapleton's location is certainly one of the top considerations for our buyers. Obviously, the quality of our homes and the community as a whole play a big role as well."





Sustainability at Stapleton

't's time again to get kids ready for the upcoming school year. When choosing products this year remember to help your kids and our environment by making eco-friendly choices in your back to school purchases.

The first step before preparing for a new school year is to sort through your old materials. Many of last year's supplies can be reused or recycled. Then, once you have figured out what you need, follow these handy tips below:

Backpacks - Reuse your backpack! If you absolutely need a new pack then look for backpacks that have a lifetime warranty or can easily be washed and reused by other family members.

Lunchboxes - Purchase a lunchbox and then fill it with reusable containers. It will save you money over the school year by decreasing your use of disposable plastic and paper bags, as well as reduce your school's garbage.

Refillable Pens and Pencils - When you use refillable pens or pencils you are saving natural resources as well as the need for your student to carry a pencil sharpener or worry about breaking their pencil in the middle of a test.

Folders, Notebooks and Paper - If you are shopping for pocket folders, notebooks, and paper look for the made from recycled paper symbol. This symbol identifies products made from recycled material, and by purchasing these products you help to close the loop on recycling. Some stores even carry 100% post-consumer recycled content notebooks.

Packaging - Waste from packaging accounts for more than 30% of all the waste generated each year. Use school supplies wrapped with minimal packaging; use compact or concentrated products; or buy products that come in bulk sizes.

Spread the Word - Don't be shy about telling the managers at your favorite stores that you and your friends are interested in seeing more green items on the shelves.

Answers to Your Stapleton Farmers Market Questions!

he Stapleton Farmers Market is in full swing Sunday mornings from 9-1 in the 29th Avenue Town Center with an average of about 20 vendors each week. Many more fruits and vegetables grown in Colorado start ripening in August and September, so if you have not made it out to the Stapleton Farmers Market yet this year be sure to stop by soon!

The Stapleton Farmers Market strives to be a well-rounded market with a variety of vendors so that shoppers can buy Colorado fruits and vegetables, fresh bread, meat and fish and other agricultural items. Many of you are familiar with farmers markets around the country, as well as other markets around the Front Range. In general, farmers markets take years to grow. The Stapleton Farmers Market is just in its fourth year, and it takes a while for a farmers market to mature. For comparison's sake, the Boulder Farmers Market was established over 20 years ago and the Cherry Creek Fresh Market has been operating for over 10 years now. While the Stapleton Farmers Market is a relatively young market, it is already showing great potential.

So far this year we have heard from over 60 Stapleton Farmers Market customers who have filled out feedback questionnaires either at the market or on the Stapleton intranet. Thank you for your honest feedback! Many people had similar comments and questions, so we will try to answer some of the most common questions below:

Fruit and Vegetable Vendors: As of the middle of July, we had two regular fruit vendors (Forté Farms and Ela Family Farms) and three regular vegetable vendors (Palizzi Farm, Fud Local Edibles and The Tomato Stand). We are trying to get another large vegetable vendor to come to our market, but in order for potential new vendors to be interested in joining the market they must feel like there is strong community support each week. If you want the market to grow – and we've heard from many of you that you do – encourage your family and friends to come each week and buy as much as pos-

Organics: The market managers are aware of the desire for organic options at the Stapleton Farmers Market. There already are some organic options: Ela Family Farms grows organic peaches, The Tomato Stand has organic tomatoes, Fud Local Edibles grows organic salad greens, herbs and other vegetables, and this year from Goodnight Loving Natural Beef you can even buy beef from cattle raised without the use of hormones, steroids and antibiotics and who are fed only natural grasses, grains and water. If you have any questions about how an item was grown or raised, feel free to ask the

Prepared Food: Paz Tortillas cooks up a tasty quesadilla on site and also offers hot tamales and breakfast burritos. You can also buy apple strudel from Styria Bakery, or pick up some coffee and breakfast breads from Thomas Bros Coffee & Chai. Many people have asked about bringing back Steve's Snappin Dogs, a favorite vendor



from the first and second seasons of the Stapleton Farmers Market. They now have a permanent, year-round operation near Colorado and Colfax so they no longer participate in markets. We understand you want more prepared foods and the market managers are working to bring in more options.

Location: The Stapleton Farmers Market moved from Founder's Green after the first season because the layout and logistics of that site did not function well for the vendors. We have been investigating moving the Stapleton Farmers Market to Central Park. This location would still be near major arterials, which is critical to the vendors for visibility and the ability to attract drive-by traffic, and would also put the market in a more central location to more Stapleton residents. The drawback of this location is that it would likely reduce participation from adjacent neighborhoods such as Park Hill. Once Central Park opens we will be able to determine if there is a suitable location for the market in the park, and work on securing the proper authorizations since Central Park will be part of the City and County of Denver's park system. We do not want to relocate the Stapleton Farmers Market each season, so if and when we do move it we want to make sure that we are moving it to its final location.

Starting Date and Times: The reason the Stapleton Farmers Market does not open until June is because we are focused on providing access to Colorado grown produce. Not a lot grows in Colorado in the spring! In fact, if you look at the Colorado Crop Calendar sign at the market, most Colorado produce does not come into season until August and September. As for the market operating from 9-1, we will revisit this at the end of this season. We recognize that many members of the Stapleton community would like the market to open earlier, but we have to balance the needs of the buyers with the needs of the vendors.

Thank you for your input and support; we appreciate the time you have taken to provide feedback. Continue to take advantage of the feedback forms on site at the Stapleton Farmers Market to let us know what you would like to see at the market. It is your local farmers market and it will continue to grow as the Stapleton community grows!

Pregnancy and Your Oral Health

Should I get my teeth cleaned if I am pregnant? Is it safe to bleach my teeth? These are questions frequently asked by patients concerned about dental treatment during pregnancy. As dental practitioners it's our job to determine the efficacy and necessity of these procedures and making sure pregnancy wellness is our main concern.

Is it safe to get my teeth cleaned? Yes! In fact, preventive dental cleanings and exams every 6 months is the dental standard. The increase in hormone levels during pregnancy causes the gums to swell and bleed and this can lead to pregnancy gingivitis. Preventive dental work treating gum disease is essential to avoid oral infection which has been linked to preterm birth.

Are local anesthetics used in dental treatment safe? It depends. The studies are conflicting regarding possible side effects on fetal development. Lidocaine is the most popular anesthetic used for dental treatment. It does cross the placenta barrier after administration. If dental treatment is necessary, the smallest amount of anesthetic possible to achieve numbness is recommended. However when you are comfortable, the amount of stress on you and the baby is significantly less. Most dental practitioners will use carbocaine because it doesn't contain epinephrine (adrenaline rush) and the studies are less vague on its efficacy and therapeutic margin of safety.

Is regular dental work safe during pregnancy? Elective treatment such as cosmetic work or bleaching (office and at home) should be avoided. Though the risk is minimal why take a risk? Treatment during the first trimester should be avoided since fetal organ development occurs during this period. Treatment during the second trimester is the safest. Anything that potentially can lead to an oral or dental infection should be treated. However emergency treatment like a root canal or extraction shouldn't be postponed and referral to a specialist can monitor your vitals during treatment.

Are dental x-rays necessary? If possible postpone routine annual x-rays until after the baby is born. In an emergency situation an x-ray will be necessary. According to the American College of Radiology "no single diagnostic x-ray contains a radiation dose significant enough to cause harm to the developing fetus."

The American Dental Association provides a list of recommendations regarding dental needs during pregnancy:

- 1. Eat a well balanced diet and brush your teeth and gums with a fluoridated tooth paste twice a day. Floss daily!
- 2. Let your dentist know you are pregnant.
- 3. Routine cleanings and exams are recommended.
- 4. Postpone non emergency treatment until the second trimester or until after delivery if possible.
- 4. Postpone elective treatment until after delivery.
- 5. Maintain healthy circulation in the dental chair by keeping your legs uncrossed during your visit.
- 6. Use a pillow to keep you and baby comfortable.





Getting to Know Stapleton United Neighbors: The SUN Transportation Committee

The SUN Transportation Committee works with the community, Forest City, the Stapleton Development Corporation, the Stapleton Citizens Advisory Board, the Stapleton Foundation, the City of Denver and other transportation authorities to address neighborhood and nearby traffic and transit issues, as well as bicycle and pedestrian transportation issues. With street connections and the number and locations of residents at Stapleton continually evolving, new transportation issues continue to arise. The Committee provides input as future plans for transportation at Stapleton move forward, while also helping to facilitate discussion and resolution of issues that arise in areas of existing development.

Regular meetings of the SUN Transportation Committee are held on the second Wednesday of every odd-numbered month at 6:30 p.m., at 3126 Elmira Court. Please consider joining us to help provide input into our community's traffic and transportation issues. To be added to our SUN Transportation Committee distribution list, send your name and email address to paul.frohardt@comcast.net. Three examples of issues being addressed by the Committee follow.

The SUN Transportation Committee and the SUN Board have consistently expressed support for developing safe and convenient options for bicycle and pedestrian crossings of I-70, to link north and south Stapleton. Although there is a current bicycle/pedestrian crossing of I-270 at Quebec, which then connects with the Sand Creek Greenway trail under I-70, there are a number of shortcomings to this alternative. Unfortunately, due to legal constraints and use for construction activities, the existing "cargo bridge" across I-70 is not an option for bicycles and pedestrians for the foreseeable future. SUN has discussed with Forest City and others options that include (1) a new, separate bicycle and pedestrian bridge across I-70 and (2) bicycle and pedestrian features in conjunction with the planned new Central Park Boulevard I-70 interchange that do not require crossing traffic (e.g., ramps over the highway entrance and exit lanes).

SUN representatives have participated in numerous

discussions with Forest City and Denver Public Works about pedestrian safety crossing Syracuse and Roslyn at 29th Avenue. The City has determined that traffic and pedestrian volume at this intersection do not presently warrant adding traffic signals. The City has added large, bright yellow pedestrian crosswalk warning signs, and added white stripes on the street to make the crosswalks more visible. In addition, as of July 12, Forest City has installed electronic driver feedback signs on both Syracuse and Roslyn to warn drivers when they are traveling too fast.

A third example of an issue being addressed by the SUN Transportation Committee (as well as the Zoning and Planning Committee of the Citizens Advisory Board) is safe bicycle and pedestrian access to the new Eastbridge Town Center, which is scheduled to begin construction later this year. Our Committee first explored the possibility of adding traffic signals across both the eastbound and westbound lanes of Martin Luther King Boulevard at Geneva Court, which will be the main street of the new town center. This was determined not to be feasible, since traffic signals are already in place at Fulton and at Havana. The Committee is currently exploring the feasibility of access to the town center "island" at the Fulton crosswalk. This option would allow bicycle and pedestrian traffic to utilize a traffic signal to access the town center from either the west or east sides of Stapleton.

In addition to the issues of broader community interest such as those described above, the SUN Transportation Committee addresses numerous site-specific issues concerning speeding, speed limits, stop sign placement, etc. We welcome you to join us in our efforts!

- Denver Police Officers will stop by the COP Shop from time-to-time to file reports, check-in with the community, and help us with current issues
- The purpose of the COP Shop is to give the community a way to help make their neighborhoods safer, and encourage positive working relationships between law enforcement and the public
- The following is a list of just a few of the programs that we would like to see coming out of our COP Shop:
- Reports/referrals to city agencies such as reporting potholes, dark traffic lights, and other 311-types of issues
- Reporting on criminal complaints and activities such as burglaries, graffiti, smashed house and/or car windows, suspicious activities
- Self-defense classes for men, women, and children
- Speed-check/Radar gun training to track speeding in your
- Bicycle registration program for more effective recovery of stolen bicycles
- Important helmet training for children
- Neighborhood Watch Training
- Scheduling Home Visits with the DPD to provide home safety tips
- Provide a resource on where to go for more information such as the Denver Citizens for Crime Prevention, neighborhood crime statistics, and updates on registered sex offenders

The Quebec Square COP Shop is not due to open until January, 2008. But the Northfield COP Shop is open now, and needs volunteers! Let's get started there while we are waiting for the Quebec Square COP Shop to open! We can begin training, and become actively involved in safety now!! This is your chance to get actively involved in Safety in Stapleton!






three children. Like many artists, Dean has developed a process that helps him take advantage of his creative instinct. "I start with three blank canvases and apply a single color on all three canvases," he explains. "I just keep adding color until the paintings seem done. It can take a couple of nights or a couple of months. I usually hang the paintings in my house after they are done to see if I like them over time. If they don't pass the time test, they go back in the studio and get reworked. The paintings that pass the test either get stored, hung in my house, or sold."

While Dean occasionally sells his paintings to friends and family, the joy of it is in the creative process. "I am a director of implementation for a small software company in Denver," Dean says. "My job requires a lot of client communication, along with technical and business knowledge. Painting is a great way for me to let go of everyday issues and immerse myself into nothing but color and artistic instinct."

Dean has one artistic claim to fame few know about. Fifteen years ago he produced a series of 200 clay sculptures called Dogman. "A well-known collector in Chicago purchased one of the Dogmen," Dean says, "and included the piece when she donated her collection to the Rockford Illinois Art Museum in 1995."
