s parents begin to think about middle school options for their kids, the Front Porch has assembled overviews of neighborhood and charter schools serving middle schoolers in the NE Denver area. Some of the following schools

are stand-alone middle schools, some are part of a K-8 program, and some are part of a grade 6 through high school program. More in-depth information can be found on the websites referenced here, by attending open house events, or visiting the schools.

DSST Middle School

On the heels of the successful Denver School of Science and Technology (DSST) High School, the new DSST Middle School welcomed its first class of 140 sixth graders in the 2008-2009 school year. DSST Middle School is taking applications through January 26th for 6th and 7th grade for the 2009-2010 school year and will be fully enrolled with grades 6 through 8 in 2010.

As a tuition-free charter school within the Denver Public Schools system, DSST Middle School program is modeled after the DSST High (continued on page 26)

War II and to attempt to repay a debt to

them caused by institutional racism during

age 90, says there are 11 Airmen in Colorado, all of whom received the Congressional Medal of Honor.

Newsom is unaware of how many of them will be traveling to Washington for the inauguration, but he will be at the head of the line.

He says he's overwhelmed by the invitation to the White House and if he had to, he would "crawl to get there." He feels that it is so

significant that the majority of the country elected Mr. Obama and he feels "the greatest honor to be invited as part of the original Tuskegee group." (continued on page 4)





Invitation to the Inauguration

(continued from p.1) After reading in the New York Times that Tuskegee Airmen would be invited, Colonel Newsom was contacted by a public relations official in Washington inviting him to attend.

Newsom states that when President Harry Truman desegregated the armed forces in 1948, most of the country didn't know the Tuskegee Airmen even existed. "What a tragedy," he says "that it took so long for the Airmen to get the recognition they deserved." He is appreciative that President Truman acknowledged that they, too, were (and are) Americans, and states that for the first Black American President to invite them to be recognized in Washington is totally remarkable.


He went on to say, "It was no picnic back then." He sent in an application to go to the Air Corps and was rejected. His third rejection came back with a note that said, "it is not the policy of the Air Corps to mix Blacks and Whites." He was finally accepted into the National Guard in New York which was conveniently located around the corner from where he lived. He was then sent to Hawaii where he became commander of the anti-aircraft missile group. He returned to the states March 23, 1943 and went to Tuskegee, Alabama where the Airmen trained. Mr. Newsom spent thirty years

on active duty and retired as full colonel.

Mr. Newsom was born in Manhattan, New York but was taken to the British West Indies at an early age. He was on the Island of Trinidad when he saw his first airplane, but didn't really know what it was. After the pilot landed and took off, Mr. Newsom ran and stared at it until it disappeared into the clouds. He was ten years old at the time and told his mother that was what he wanted to do. When they came back to the States, he started planning to become a pilot, but there was no money for flying lessons.

When President Roosevelt made the arrangements with the National Guard in New York, Mr. Newsom was told that there would be a good number of Blacks included. Thirty-three Black men took the exam and thirteen passed. They were all admitted to Officers Candidate School, but Mr. Newsom wanted to go to flight school at Tuskegee. He finally got his wish, but he said he had to fight discrimination every step of the way. However, in spite of all the difficulties, disappointments and rejections, he is most proud to be an original Tuskegee Airman and he is looking forward with eager anticipation to his visit to Washington on January 20, 2009.

The Relevance of Dr. King's Message

anuary 15th will mark the 80th birthday of a great African-American who was born the grandson of a slave in 1929. Martin Euther King, Jr. lived and died a great leader among men. Born to greatness, he was no ordinary child, having graduated from high school at age 15 and earned a Ph.D. in theology from Boston University at age 26.

Rev. Dr. King first emerged as a leader of national prominence in 1955. As a 26-year-old minister in Montgomery, Alabama, King had adopted the non-violent civil protest philosophy of India's leader, Mohandas Gandhi. He agreed to lead a city-wide boycott against Montgomery's bus system, which required blacks to sit in the back of the bus while whites sat in the front, even though blacks paid the same fare as the white passengers.

How relevant are Dr. King's work and message today? And, who is now carrying the torch? There are those who argue that it is because of Dr. King's legacy and message that the tall, skinny Black man with the big ears and funny name (as the media has referenced President-elect, Barack Obama), was not only able to win the Democratic presidential nomination, but also become the 44th president of the United States. They believe that Dr. King's work, for which he ultimately gave his life, helped to make Obama's election possible by calling to the forefront the deep-seated and divisive issue of race in America.


Dr. Vincent Harding, professor emeritus of

the Iliff School of Theology and founder of the Veterans Of Hope project, worked closely with Dr. King. He reminds us that Dr. King's message was really three-pronged, encompassing not just racism, but materialism and mili-

tarism. Dr. Harding and Dr. King had met when Dr. Harding was participating in a leadership group of a small interracial Mennonite congregation in Chicago in 1958 and they were seeking ways to build their church membership. The question was raised about what would happen if they were in the South and moved across racial lines. They decided to attempt to answer that question by having three whites and two blacks pile into an old station wagon and drive to Little Rock, Arkansas, pledging to each other that they would not allow the group to be separated if they truly believed they were brothers. They had wanted to seek Dr. King's input; however, at the time, Dr. King was still recuperating from a stab wound he had suffered during a book signing.

Subsequently Dr. Harding and his wife moved to the South, and Dr. King and Dr. Harding formed a lasting relationship and worked very closely for ten years.

Dr. Harding shared Dr. King's vehement opposition to the Viet Nam war. When Dr. King was invited to speak to clergy and laymen who had voiced concern about the war and what the Christian response to the war should be, Dr. Harding largely wrote the speech Dr. King gave (continued on page 9)

angar 61, built in 1959 as the "garage" for a corporate plane when L Stapleton was an airport, has spent the last 20-25 years sitting idle, waiting for someone to recognize its architectural value and give it a new job.

It has taken a while, but finally Hangar 61, located at Montview and Central Park boulevards, has been given a new life.

Three or four years ago, Hangar 61 came to the attention of Colorado Preservation Inc., the state organization "interested in preserving places around the state that have historic significance," according to its president, Dan Love.

Love is a son of former Colorado Gov. John Love, who resigned his post in 1972 to serve nearly two years as "Energy Czar" in the Nixon Administration. After his stint in Washington, D.C., the elder Love took over as head of Ideal Basic Industries, which principally produced cement and built Hangar 61 for its corporate airplane. Dan Love remembers flying out of Hangar 61 with his

When Forest City Stapleton, Inc. and the City and County of Denver began discussing plans for use of the space that the hangar occupied, Colorado Preservation, Inc. took a look at the structure.

"We decided that it was a valuable part of our history and needed to be preserved," Love said. "We put the building on our Most Endangered Places list, designed to bring attention to places that are in danger of being

lost due to redevelopment."

Today, Colorado Preservation, Inc. owns Hangar 61 and has put money into it to help stabilize the structure, along with a grant from the State Historical Fund, which is money supplied by gaming revenues that funds grants for preservation projects.

"The objective is to create an environment in which a solution can be found other than demolition," Love explained. "Typically, we monitor each of the listings. They are classified in three ways: threatened, progress and saved. While we are not yet ready to declare Hangar 61 as saved, it is clearly experiencing a great deal of progress, largely through Ruth Falkenberg's and Larry Nelson's efforts."


Falkenberg and Nelson have formed Hangar 61 LLC, and consider themselves an advocacy group that is a "developer-partner" of Colorado Preservation, according to Falkenberg.

While some other hangars in the Stapleton area were demolished, Hangar 61 remained standing because it was interesting, Falkenberg explained.

"It's pretty unusual and striking," she said. "One of the things that's unusual about it is its engineering. There are no structural supports inside. It is supported by two bulkheads on either end.

Hangar 61 has gone through the Stapleton design review process and has been OKd for use as an office building, she explained.

Work on the building to strengthen its structural support and garner attraction from potential buyers or renters is nearly complete,

according to Falkenberg.

"We are now finishing the grading and the parking lot and the sidewalks," she said. "Utilities have been brought to the building. We will build the interior to suit the buyer or tenant. We have always imagined office space with its 30-ft. high center. We imagined a small mezzanine so that you could have more square footage, but have open space. We are open to creative ideas.

"We're not committed to any use, but have always thought it would be a great office building for an architectural firm or a marketing firm, someone who could use the building as their logo," she said.

Now that the former tenants — pigeons and a hawk — have been evicted, the roof has been replaced and the lot has been spruced, plans are to replace the fiberglass windows on the north and south sides with glass windows that will allow more light into the building, Falkenberg said.

"Once we have completed the steps that we are responsible for, we will turn it over to Ruth and Larry," Love said. "They will buy it from us. They will then, hopefully, find someone to use it in a productive way and give it some future life."

Love encouraged people throughout the state to contact Colorado Preservation about saving historic places.


"We are very interested in preserving places around the state that have historic significance," Love said. "We especially need the cooperation of citizen groups to take an interest in those places that are important to the neighborhoods."

The Endangered Places List is created from an annual review of places around Col-

orado through a nomination process from local entities, he explained. The process is reviewed locally, regionally and then by the Colorado Preservation Board of Directors.

"We encourage people to be part of that process. We're more than willing to coach them through it," Love said.

Urban Farm Teen Takes Scottish Highland Heifer to Stock Show

hirteen-year-old David Crawford has been going to the National Western Stock Show since he was one-year-old. In fact, the Stock Show gave him the impetus to keep livestock at the Stapleton Urban Farm, where he works with three Scottish Highland cows, one horse, three goats and three chickens.

This year, the 4-H member will show one of his Scottish Highland heifers during the Stock Show to fulfill one of his dreams.

It is a dream that he developed through his mother, Carla Crawford.

"One year I started horseback riding at the Urban Farm, and then we came back the next summer and volunteered," David said. "Mom went to the Stock Show that year and came back and wanted a cow."

"I interacted with a Scottish Highland cow and her calf," Carla explained. "I thought, 'I need one of those.' We were already enrolled in 4-H at that point. I asked if it could live at the Urban Farm."

Carla and her husband, Roger, grew up in an urban setting. She later gained a passion for livestock, but Roger doesn't share in it.

"He just doesn't understand the passion for livestock that the rest of us have. We just give him entertainment value," Carla laughed.

The Crawfords bought the Scottish Highland heifer, which has a wooly look, last year at the Stock Show.

"One of the other heifers pulls a cart," Carla said. "She's like a giant golden retriever. She follows us around like a puppy dog. We have to be careful not to turn around too quick because those horns are long."

They also have chickens, which David's 9-year-old sister, Jessica, will show at the Stock Show this year. Both David and Jessica love to ride horses. The Crawfords also have a horse, and David takes classes in team roping.


Stapleton's Urban Farm has enabled the Crawfords to learn about caring for livestock and to share their passion with other urbanites, Carla said.

"I think it's fabulous," she said. "I so wish that more people knew about it. It's such a great experience. Kids don't even know where eggs come from. They're amazed when I go into the hen house and bring out eggs. That's something we miss. When we go to the grocery store and buy things, they don't realize that it has to be grown some place."

Urban Farm Stock Show Activity for Kids

Carla is one of the Urban Farm volunteers who will help with a game show for 3rd to 7th graders at the National Western Stock Show at 10 and 11am each day in the Beef Palace.

"We get kids up on stage. We have farm animals there. We make a statement about an ani-

to that group. "Dr. King's back-breaking schedule did not allow time for him to adequately explore the issues, so by my channeling him, I knew what was on Dr. King's mind and I was able to record his ideas, sentiments and convictions as we shared the same feelings about the war. It was a real collaboration," Dr. Harding stated.

Dr. Harding maintains that each generation must articulate its own issues and concerns and work for their implementation and decide what the course of action should be. "We must continue to ask the questions," he says, "what do we believe and where do we go from here?"

In his book, *Martin Luther King: The Inconvenient Hero*, Dr. Harding writes that Dr. King's message not only keeps us moving against all odds, but also moving toward a more perfect union and toward a more just, humane and sustainable world. He quotes Rabbi Abraham J. Heschel who stated that "the whole future of America depends upon the impact and influence of Dr. King."

One of the most poignant stories in his book was about a young boy who asked Dr. Harding why Dr. King didn't just "chill out" and quit if he knew that his life was in danger. A young female member of the assembly responded emphatically: "Dr. King couldn't just quit, he had work to do." Dr. Harding affirms the statement that we still have work to do, emphasizing that Dr. King admonished all to look at the qualifications of the

person rather than just looking at skin color, and not let our religion, social values or other irrelevant issues divide and conquer.

Dr. Harding also calls on America to live up to its true creed that all people are created equal. He believes we can all carry part of the load by contributing positively—individually and collectively—simply by getting up every day and going to work, taking care of our families and being active, caring, and contributing members of our communities specifically and to society in general.

Dr. King delivered his famous "I Have A Dream" speech in 1963. It was five years later, on April 4, 1968, that his voice was stilled by an assassin's bullet as he stood on the balcony of the Lorraine Motel in Memphis where he had traveled to aid the city's sanitation workers as they too pressed for equal rights. In recognition of his work, Dr. King's birthday was declared a national holiday in 1986, with the 3rd Monday in January designated as Martin Luther King Day. Denver's celebration to commemorate Dr. King is one of the largest in the nation. (See events on page 12.)

To honor Dr. King's work, his fraternity, Alpha Phi Alpha, is spearheading the building of a statue of him on the national mall in Washington, DC. Organizers are they will be able to raise \$100 million to erect the memorial in 2010.





teaming bowls of spaghetti and marinara sauce.

Juicy, hand-rolled meatballs. Plump clams glis-

tening with herbs and white wine. Crisp Caesar salads adorned with salty anchovies. A bountiful glass of Barbera. Now these are a few of my favorite things.

Some call Shells and Sauce "urban-Italian" or American-Italian. Yet, what seems like a quiet corner restaurant on the outside is far more than what first meets the eye. With its 15 foot ceilings, butternut squash and terra cotta splotched walls, trendy glowing lights, builtin garage door and full bar, Shells and Sauce is the quintessential neighborhood eatery: perfect for a quick, late night dinner, a casual drink at the bar, a lazy Sunday brunch or a mid-afternoon glass of wine.

Plus, dinner for two (including tax and tip) can leave patrons feeling completely satisfied for \$40 or even \$30 with some creative pairing. Whereas many restaurants

can leave diners in the hole after the first bottle of wine, Shells and Sauce offers a great selection of by-the-glass bargains, starting at \$6.95. Be sure to check out the ever-changing chalkboard, which lists the daily antipasti specials. At \$4, these small-plate-inspired bites are perfect palate sparkers. Take the calzone de pesce, juicy caramelized pieces of salmon enrobed in provolone, piquant marinara and a thin crispy-chewy layer of pizza dough. Truthfully, one is able to have a full meal sharing a variety of appetizers alone.

Each time friends and I have gone to Shells and Sauce, the menu seems to be getting bigger. However, here are a few must-have entrée suggestions. Lasagna (\$12.95): blankets of pasta, ricotta and provolone, marinara, oregano, ground sirloin and Italian sausage—a piping-hot behemoth of saucy, creamy delights. (And, leftovers a plenty are even better the next day). Gnocchi



(\$10.95): house-made potato dumplings, toasted walnuts and a surprisingly light gorgonzola sauce. Each meal begins with pillowy-soft bread and a balsamic and oil dipping sauce. Therefore, you are lucky if you still have room come dessert time.



Eating For Health

Did You Get Your Vitamin D Today?

You might already know that vitamin D is essential for healthy bones and teeth, but did you realize that it plays a role in maintaining a healthy immune system, too?

In fact, current research findings suggest that vitamin D may positively influence the immune system.

Vitamin D is considered a hormone as well as a vitamin for its role in body processes. It works together with calcium and phosphorus to strengthen bones and teeth, and aids in assimilation of vitamin A. Vitamin D may also help eye problems such as conjunctivitis, Myopia, and cataracts as well as auto-immune diseases like multiple sclerosis and rheumatoid arthritis.

The "sunshine vitamin" can be manufactured by the body out of sunlight when the energy in the sun's rays initiates a chemical reaction in exposed skin. Here in Denver we are blessed with over 300 sunny days each year – more than Miami! –which gives us lots of opportunities to get outside and absorb some sunshine.

Just five to 30 minutes of casual sunlight exposure each day is enough to provide most people with the vitamin D they need. Because clothing and sunscreen can affect vitamin D absorption, the benefits of sun exposure have to be balanced with the risks, so be aware of how long you're exposed.

When you can't get outside, be sure to eat foods that contain vitamin D (see below). An easy and delicious recipe for dinner, Sesame-Soy Salmon delivers a good load of vitamin D along with unsaturated fats, omega-3 essential fatty acids, whole grains, and lots of vegetables to support and maintain not only the immune system, but the nervous system and digestive systems, as well.

Sesame-Soy Salmon (Serves 2)

1 tablespoon sesame oil, divided 1 cup dry parboiled, precooked brown rice (usually sold as "Instant Brown Rice") 1/2 to 3/4 pound salmon fillet or steak

2 carrots, cut into julienne strips

2 tablespoons low-sodium soy sauce

1 teaspoon rice wine vinegar

1/8 teaspoon sugar

1 teaspoon grated fresh ginger

2 garlic cloves, minced

1 teaspoon red pepper flakes

1/2 teaspoon sesame seeds

1 tablespoon lemon juice 1/4 head purple cabbage, shredded

1 avocado, sliced

Cooking instructions:

Preheat the oven to 450° F.

Coat the inside of a cast iron Dutch oven and lid with one teaspoon sesame oil or spray with capola oil

Scatter the rice in the pot and add one cup plus one tablespoon water. Place the salmon in the pot (it is okay if it's slightly submerged in water) and scatter the carrots on top.

In a small bowl, mix together the soy sauce, vinegar, half-teaspoon sesame oil, sugar, ginger, garlic, red pepper flakes, sesame seeds, and lemon juice. Stir until sugar is dissolved. Pour half of the mixture over the fish.

Layer in the cabbage shreds and any other vegetables and top with avocado slices. Pour on the rest of the mixture.

Cover and bake for 45 minutes, or until three minutes after the aroma of a fully cooked meal escapes the oven. Fluff the rice as serving, and serve immediately.

rthodontia no longer is primarily for children. It is for "anyone looking for correction of bite or teeth, either for function or aesthetics," according to Dr. Karen Franz, an orthodontist whose office, Stapleton Orthodontics, is located in Stapleton on the corner of East 23rd Avenue and Central Park in the ReMax Building.

"More and more adults every year are getting orthodontia," she said. "There are so many more options.

"Some patients do notice that they're not as pleased with their teeth or bite and call on their own. Some are referred by their dentist. It's really both," she explained.

Franz, herself, had orthodontic work done about three years ago, wearing braces on both her upper and lower teeth.

"It's really a new trend that adults are getting braces now," she said. "It really depends on individual needs of patients. Invisalign: a lot of adults will opt for that treatment. But, if there are more complex needs, we use more traditional orthodontic wires. There are traditional brackets made of ceramic, and they're tooth-colored, so you really don't see them on your teeth."

Franz was born in Fort Collins and attended Colorado State University. She went to the University of California, Los Angeles (UCLA), where she found a love for a specialty in the field of orthodontics.

"When I was in dental school, I started

volunteering on UCLA's cleft lip and palate team," she explained. The team included a plastic surgeon, pediatrician, speech therapist,

audiologist and orthodontist who all worked

together to treat children with cleft lip and

palate and other cranial conditions of the lip

"I saw the difference it was making in children's lives," she said. "I like doing work on young children. Children who need teeth straightened are the main portion of my patient population."

"I think probably the main thing about my office is that I really make an effort to spend one-on-one time with the patients," Franz said. "I always try to educate my patients because what I'm seeing as an orthodontist may be different than what they are seeing. I want them to be educated about their teeth and what can be done to benefit them.

"I want people to know that orthodontics can benefit a wide range of ages of people from age 7 on. At age 7, we want to make sure their teeth are growing properly. Some children can benefit from orthodontia."

Franz is married and lives in Park Hill. She and her husband returned to Colorado about six months ago and are eager to ski again, she said. She also enjoys biking and swimming, and is a frequent traveler. Her last major trip was to New Zealand and Fiji last year.


"We understand that children need to be children. Our education needs to be play-based. They're learning, but it's fun for them to learn."




trash along 29th Avenue a couple days a week, David is making a huge contribution in the Stapleton community with his actions.

homebuilder at Stapleton, has seen the ups and downs of residential homebuilding for more than 25 years, an experience that has led his company to make timely adjustments to weather the difficult economy while still maintaining values that have made his company successful.

We reacted to the downturn earlier than most builders and have 'right sized"' ourselves with staffing and main office overhead, "said Myers. "During this difficult economy, we have invested in new systems to streamline our company and make it more "user friendly" for our customers and trade partners." He said those new systems include a "punch list manager" that organizes warranty work orders and eases communication between New Town, its homeowners and the subcontractors performing the work to improve tracking and speed up warranty repairs.

"Even without improvement in the overall market, we are able to continue to build homes for new customers and be there for our existing home owners," he added.

In addition to the single family homes New Town offers at Stapleton from the high \$300s, the builder has also achieved recent success in working with Forest City in the development and sale of affordable homes. In the past year, New Town worked successfully to sell-out the Roslyn Court and Syracuse Village affordable homes adjacent to the E. 29th Avenue Town Center and realized strong sales in the first phase of the 29th Drive Row Homes, located on Havana just east of the planned Eastbridge Town Center.

Pay Attention to Parents' **Investment Strategies**

f your parents are getting older, you may have to assist them in various aspects of daily life — one of which may be their *investment strategies*. And by being "proactive," you may be able to make things much easier for Mom and Dad in their retirement years.

One of the best things you can do for your parents is to find out if they are investing in a way that's appropriate for their situation. As many people age, they tend to become more financially conservative, choosing investments that offer significant protection of principal, such as certificates of deposit (CDs) and U.S. Treasury securities. And of course, this is understandable, because your parents, like many people at their stage of life, probably don't want to take too many financial risks. And yet by "taking no chances" with their money, they could actually be taking on *more* risk than they think.

Why? Because by investing too conservatively, they might not be able to afford the lifestyle they've chosen, given the importance of two factors: longevity and inflation.

Let's consider longevity first. The average 65year-old man is expected to live 16.5 more years, while the average 65-year-old woman has 19.1 more years of life expectancy, according to the Social Security Administration. And these figures, as noted, are averages, which means that half of all men and half of all women can expect to live *longer* than 81.5 years and 84.1 years, respectively.

Consequently, your parents could easily spend two or three decades in retirement. And if they're investing predominantly in fixed-income vehicles, their returns may not even keep up with inflation. For example, suppose your parents' total cost of living is currently \$80,000 per year. If inflation were to average 3 percent annually over the next 20 years, your parents would then need more than \$144,000 per year just to maintain the standard of living they enjoy today.

So, given the possibility of a long retirement combined with the cumulative effects of inflation, your parents will likely need at least some growth potential in their investment portfolio. A reasonable percentage of quality stocks may be able to provide them with that potential, but their mix of investments really depends on their individual needs, lifestyle choices and risk tolerance.

Here's one other investment-related question you may want to raise with your parents: How much should they take out each year from their 401(k) and IRA? It's essential that they neither withdraw so much that they deplete their accounts nor so little that they can't afford the things they enjoy. Yet because the ideal withdrawal rate depends on several factors — among them investment mix, risk tolerance, life expectancy and other sources of income it's not always easy to determine the appropriate

You might not have the expertise to help your parents address these two issues — choosing the right investments during their retirement years and taking out the right amounts from their 401(k) and IRA. And that's why you may want to encourage your parents to work with a professional financial advisor, if they don't already have one. At their stage of life, they need to make the right moves with their money — so do all you can to help. You'll be glad you made the effort.

Changing Unwanted Behaviors Through Hypnotherapy

¬ very year, the holidays seem to creep up a little faster than the year before. For many of us, shopping, airports, tricky weather, and late nights cooking and celebrating with family and friends are a recipe for stress. And then before we know it, New Years is here and we are promising ourselves that next year, we are going to change lifelong habits, slow down and enjoy life more. But without additional help, this can be a set-up

Today, more and more people are turning to alternative medicine to help with a variety of ailments. Hypnotherapy, a guided visualization technique, is fast becoming a popular tool for changing unwanted behaviors and reactions like stress and anxiety, fears and phobias, low self esteem, chronic pain, smoking, and weight management. Although hypnosis has been around for centuries, modern hypnotherapy has only found its way into mainstream health care in recent years.

How does it work? The Journal of Clinical Psychology (41, (1), 35-41) indicated that subjects who underwent hypnosis were more effective in slimming down - and staying slim! - than participants who relied on behavioral tools alone.

In addition to altering lifelong beliefs and reaction patterns, hypnotherapy works by reducing blood pressure, muscle tension and lowering the production of stress hor-

Winter tours, photography programs spotlight national symbol

he arrival of our national symbol, the American bald eagle, is a sure sign that Old Man Winter has returned to the Rocky Mountain Arsenal National Wildlife Refuge. Bald eagles migrate to the Refuge when the weather north of Colorado turns colder, freezing the water and making it difficult for the eagles to catch fish and find food.

The RMA National Wildlife Refuge provides a winter haven for bald eagles. With diets consisting mainly of fish and small mammals, bald eagles enjoy the healthy food supply provided by the lakes and natural prairie habitat of the Refuge. For the past decade, eagles have returned each winter to the large cottonwood trees along the eastern shore of one of the lakes. Over the past seven winters, a resident pair has fledged eight eaglets at the Refuge.

As part of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife

Service's commitment to biomonitoring at the Refuge, biologists conduct regular roost counts. The numbers have reached into the high 30's over the past few years during peak eagle viewing season. The roost counts are conducted when the eagles settle in for the night, and up to a dozen eagles have been found in a single tree.

Refuge visitors can view and photograph these magnificent birds by participating in tours and programs, such as "Where Eagles Soar" and the very popular "Frosty Photo Tours." Sightings have also been reported along the hiking trails or during other nature programs offered throughout the winter months.

Bald eagles can be seen at the Refuge from December through early March. So don't let Old Man Winter keep you inside. Bundle up, enjoy the great outdoors and catch a glimpse of our wintering raptors as they fly the skies on their daylight hunts.

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service offers nature programs about these cold-weather stars of the refuge, and

Since You've Asked...

Q. Are there any plans to place a "Yield" sign at the northeast corner of Montview and Central Park for westbound traffic turning north onto Central Park?

A. Stapleton's registered neighborhood organization, Stapleton United Neighbors (SUN) has a Transportation Committee that works with the City of Denver to address issues related to signage and other traffic control issues. Contact Dennis Hanson at denverdenn@comcast.net to register your support for the sign.

Q. The composite faux light pole bases have fractured or shattered throughout Stapleton. Can those be replaced?

A. Replacement of the light poles, including the bases, is the responsibility of Xcel Energy. Jot down the number on the pole and call Xcel Energy (800.895.4999) or email www.xcelenergy.com to report the problem.

Q. Can you address the safety of the asbestos reclamation (at the future construction site east of Havana, south of MLK) for Stapleton residents and our neighboring communities?

A. The environmental remediation of that parcel is being conducted by the City and County of Denver's Department of Aviation (DIA) according to standards set by the Colorado Department of Public Health and the Environment. Contact Greg Holt of DIA at greg.holt@diadenver.net for more information

Q. When is the third elementary school scheduled to open?

A. The third school at Stapleton has been designed and was planned to be an ECE (Early Childhood Education) to grade 8 school for approximately 750 students located in the eastern portion of Stapleton. The construction of the school is contingent on enrollment demands. The Denver Public Schools (DPS) planning department estimates that there will be more students than there is capacity at William Roberts and Westerly Creek schools possibly in 2010 or 2011, although the pace of residential building will determine the actual timing and it is difficult to predict when there will be sufficient students in the ECE-8 range to warrant building a large school. DPS is currently revising enrollment projections and expects to have new projections in February 2009, but it could take longer.

DPS intends to develop options to address whatever capacity issues emerge over the next year or so and the District plans to discuss those options with the community. DPS officials plan to communicate with the principals and Collaborative School Committees at Westerly Creek and Roberts schools in the early months of this year about future school construction.



Stapleton Snow Removal

Winter snow removal throughout Stapleton is the responsibility of many different entities including individual property owners and sub-associations. Sidewalks are to be cleared from snow within 24 hours by the adjacent property owner. Where there is an adjacent sub-association, it is the sub-association's responsibility. The MCA clears snow from all sidewalks that are not adjacent to private property. This includes all the neighborhood parks and parkways. Denver Parks

and Rec is responsible for snow in and around the regional parks. Major roadways and arterials are the responsibility of Denver's department of Public Works. For a diagram of these identified roads please visit our web site. Neighborhood streets are not cleared unless a "major" snow event of one foot or more occurs. Neighborhood alleys are to be routinely cleared of snow by the adjacent property owner or sub-association.

In the event of a "Major Snow Event" (as defined by the City of Denver), the Stapleton MCA will initiate the emergency snow removal plan. The plan includes continuous use of heavy equipment, light equipment and hand work to remove snow from alleys, some intersections and major pedestrian paths. Alley work is limited to the removal of enough snow so residents can get to their alleys (this requires residents to participate by removing snow from each of their drive aprons to get from the alley to their garage). The MCA's goal is to only open up a single drive lane through each alley. Alley drive lanes will not be scraped down to pavement to eliminate the need to truck any snow off site. This allows us to expedite the process ensuring that we can get to all alleys in the shortest time possible and decrease potential damage to the alley surface. Community paths and parks will be addressed as equipment and personnel become available as to provide for safe pedestrian access. Individual snow removal concerns can be directed to the MCA office.



(continued from page 1) School, with a college preparatory focus and an emphasis on developing core liberal arts skills in reading, writing, mathematics and science.

Principal Rich Harrison says DSST Middle School uses a curriculum it developed after looking at the best charter schools across the country. Applicants come from all over the city, from all ethnicities and economic and educational backgrounds. "We are a liberal arts school with a math and science focus," he says. "We feel we have a program that reaches a wide range of students, and we want to close the gap. All our students take 1.5 hours of math and science each day, and we have phenomenal math and science teachers plus a strong intervention program for those who are behind." He says students do not have to have demonstrated a special talent for math or science to apply.

During the first part of this school year, DSST Middle School operated out of Westerly Creek Elementary in Stapleton, but will move in early 2009 to its permanent location in the new building adjacent to the DSST High School

Admission to DSST is granted through an open lottery process and maintains a diverse population of approximately 30% black, white and Hispanic students. Interested students must complete an admission application by January 26, 2009. The remaining Open House dates are scheduled for January 7th and 15th from 6:30-7:30pm at 2000 Valentia Street (please arrive by 6:00pm).



Bill Roberts ECE - Grade 8

Bill Roberts School

William "Bill" Roberts is a DPS school in Stapleton offering grades ECE through 8. Currently there is a total student population of about 650 kids, with 130 of them in middle school.

Roberts middle school aims to provide growth opportunities for each student. The schools utilizes "tiered" instruction levels that are determined through assessment, teacher observation and student input. The tiers help build basic skills, reinforce concepts, and extend learning in each subject area. Sixth grade students currently have one teacher for all core subjects. When there are more students, the school will be able to offer more opportunities for 6th graders to progress within or ahead of their grade level. Seventh and 8th graders follow a block schedule.

"Bill Roberts is a middle school where we have exceptional teachers and we really get to know your child," says Principal Trish Lea. This past year Bill Roberts' middle school students outscored the district average in 8 out of 9 CSAP test areas and showed the highest growth among DPS K-8 schools.

Students currently attending 5th grade at Bill Roberts as an "attendance area" student or as an "approved choice" student will automatically get into 6th grade at Roberts. Students who are new residents in Roberts' attendance area will need to complete a pre-enrollment form and provide the same required documents as for elementary enrollment. Students outside the attendance area may apply to "choice in" to Roberts, with the first round application deadline of January 31. If an "attendance area" or "approved choice" student accepts admission to a magnet or charter school, then that school becomes the student's home school and nullifies Roberts as the home school; if a student who has accepted enrollment at another school would like to return to Roberts, they would need to reapply.

Roberts offers middle school tours at 10am on the first Thursday of the month (Jan. will be the 2nd Thursday.

Denver School of the Arts

The Denver School of the Arts is the only comprehensive secondary arts magnet (grades 6-12) in the Rocky Mountain region. In addition to a rigorous academic program, students engage in intensive studies in Creative Writing, Dance, Music, Stagecraft and Design, Theatre, Video Cinema Arts, and Visual Arts. DSA is committed to fostering a lifelong love of the arts in a culturally diverse, academically challenging environment. In addition to these areas of programming, the curriculum also includes language arts, math, science, social studies, and world languages.

Emily Barr, mother of two DSA students (Maddie, grade 10, who studies Theatre, and Cal, grade 6, who studies Video Cinema Arts), says DSA is a wonderful choice for children who are devoted to their chosen art form. She cautions it might not be the best choice for students who don't love their area of focus since they spend 2 periods a day in their major and don't have much time for other electives.

"We never even imagined that Cal would go to DSA because he is a bit of a jock and plays a number of sports, and they don't have any athletics at DSA," Emily goes on to say. "But when Cal visited the Video Cinema Department for a morning, he was so excited and has not wanted to do anything else since then. I imagine he will do sports at East High while staying at DSA for high school like many other students do."

The deadline for application and audition for 2009-2010 school year was Dec 12th, but there is a wait list for those who would still like to apply. Academic and admission details are on the school website.

Envision Leadership Prep

Envision Leadership Prep will open as a DPS charter school for the 2009-2010 school year and will share space in the Smiley Middle School building in Park Hill. Based on the same model as the Envision Schools California, which began operations in 2002, Envision Leadership Prep believes that all students, regardless of their race, ethnicity or economic background, are entitled to attend schools that prepare them for college success and democratic citizenship in the 21st Century. Envision schools are designed to be true communities, marked by intentional diversity, rigorous academic discipline, and excellence at every level.

"When fully built-out, each Envision Schools Colorado school will serve about 700 students in grades six through 12," says Envision Schools Colorado CEO Yee-Ann Cho. "However, we will open each school intentionally small, with about 100 sixth graders and 100 ninth graders, in order to focus on creating a strong, positive culture of learning and respect. Over the next several years we will add the same two grades until the fourth year, at which point we will admit only sixth graders."

Because Envision Leadership Prep is a charter school, students can "choice in" from across the district and even across district lines. "Given our location in NE Denver," Ms. Cho says, "we hope the majority of our students will come from Park Hill and the communities immediately bordering that community."

Information sessions will be held at various elementary and middle schools in the area and at the Park Hill Library on January 13th, 20th and 27th from 6:30-7:30pm, with more dates that will be announced for February. Students should complete an application form (available on the website) and either fax or mail it in by 5:00pm February 26th; an online application process is planned. If more students apply in each grade than the school can accommodate, Envision will hold a lottery on February 27. Students who are not selected in the lottery or who apply after February 26th will be put on a wait list for the fall.





orado State Standards. The Odyssey School's learning experience includes a focus on reading and writing through literature, a rigorous math program, computers to develop students' research and thinking skills, fine arts, documentation of students' work through portfolios, regular out-of-school fieldwork, and adventures with environmental education.

"Odyssey's middle school is very strong, and our model stands out as different," says Executive Director Marcia Fulton. "If a parent wants a school that focuses on intellectual achievement, social responsibility, a strong culture of learning, environmental awareness and stewardship, leadership, learning beyond the classroom walls, and depth vs. breadth, then Odyssey is the right place."

The middle school, which has a student population of about 70 out of a total student body of 220, recently ranked 'high' in Colorado's School Accountability Reports. Fifty percent of the students are students of color, with most being African American. All teachers are Colorado State certified, with 60% holding graduate degrees. Odyssey is located in Stapleton in a shared building with West-

erly Creek Elementary.

Enrollment is determined by a lottery system, and applications are due by February 25th. Odyssey offers a middle school open house on January 13 at 6:00pm, and several general open house events in January and February. While there is high competition for available spots in the elementary grades, there is greater opportunity for enrollment in grades 6 and 7.

Smiley Middle School

Located in Park Hill, Smiley Middle School offers an International Baccalaureate Program (IB) and has about 400 students in grades 6 through 8. Starting in the Fall of 2009, Smiley will also share its facilities with Envision Leadership Prep, a new DPS charter school.

Now in its first year, the school-wide IB program at Smiley brings together the best qualities of a neighborhood middle school and a tried and proven academic program: IB works for the accelerated and challenged student alike. Smiley IB offers not only the 21st Century academics of the IB, but arts, music, theatre and athletic programs, and a strong Parent Teacher Student Association (PTSA). The program, which prepares students for high school IB program or for advanced placement courses, includes a mandatory tutoring program for kids who are not meeting the standards.

Smiley IB is hosting two open houses for families with 5th grade students to explore the program: Thursday Jan. 22 and Thursday, February 26, with tours at 5:30 and 6:30, and presentations at 6 and 7pm. All students interested in attending Smiley must take placement assessments and have an interview.

Morey Middle School

Morey Middle School, with over 800 students, is located approximately 14 blocks west of York Street on 14th Ave. Morey has a traditional middle school program, a High Strides program

in which students are expected to master the regular DPS curriculum in greater depth and at a more rigorous pace, and a Highly Gifted and talented program (HGT). Visit the website to find information on scheduling a visit. "Choice" applications for High Strides are due in January. Choice applications for the traditional program are due February 28, 2009.

Hill Campus of Arts and Sciences

Hill Campus of Arts and Sciences shares a campus with Steck Elementary 5 blocks east of Colorado, near 4th Ave. The school offers Honors, Special Education and Traditional programs and has a balanced population of approximately one third Caucasian, one third Hispanic and one third African American. Students with their parents may visit Hill Campus Tuesday-Thursday and tour the school. 5th, 6th and 7th-grade students can schedule a day to "shadow" a current Hill Campus student (Tuesday-Thursday).

Vanguard Classical School

An Aurora Public Schools tuition-free charter, Vanguard Classical School is located in Lowry. Vanguard uses the Core Knowledge Curriculum and a co-teaching model that maintains an approximate 15:1 student-teacher ratio.

Vanguard opened in a new facility in August 2007 and currently serves students through grade 7. The school will also serve grade 8 in 2009-2010, bringing the total middle school population to about 180.

The lottery for enrollment for the 2009-2010 school year is March 15th. Informational meetings will be held January 13 and 27, February 10 and 24, and March 10 at 6:30 pm in the school gymnasium. Details of the school's program and registration are available on the website.
