
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

Thile some of us ate, slept, worked, schooled, and recreated within the same four walls for much of the past year, NE Denver residents who frequented I-70 from Brighton Blvd. to the airport saw massive changes. Three separate multi-year billion-dollar projects provided much-needed employment during the pandemic and, at times, progressed faster because so many people and their cars were at home.

National Western Center

What is it and why is it happening? To fund improvements necessary to keep the iconic Stock Show in Denver, voters in 2015 overwhelmingly approved Ballot Measure 2C that extended a tax on hotel rooms and rental cars. In addition, by expanding the grounds, a year-round arts, entertainment, education, and research center is also being developed there through a funding partnership between the City and County of Denver, Western Stock Show Association and Colorado State University. The National Western Center Authority is a new non-profit that will operate, maintain, program, and promote the campus. Denver Museum of Nature and Science and History Colorado will provide additional programming.

How big is it? The original 110-acre grounds are being expanded to roughly 250 acres. By the projected completion of phases 1 & 2 in 2024, the National Western Center will have new and expanded indoor and outdoor spaces including state-of-the-art facilities, historic buildings, and riverfront open space. Additional phases are planned for the future.

How is it funded? The biggest chunk of funds for the 1.2

billion dollar project, about 62%, comes from ballot measure 2C; about 25% comes from CSU for construction of its three buildings; and about 12% comes from a Regional Tourism Act award from the State of Colorado, paid over 36 years.

Some unique features: In addition to new Stock Show facilities, 1) It will be a 21st century, year-round agricultural research center to advance global knowledge about food, water, and health. 2) It will have the largest sewer-heat recovery system in North America—a system that pulls thermal energy from wastewater instead of burning natural gas, dramatically reducing greenhouse gas emissions. 3) It will have six acres of family-friendly public open space near the South Platte riverfront for recreation and relaxation.

How did the pandemic affect the project this year? And in the future?

Following the tough decision to cancel the Stock Show due to the pandemic, "...we were actually able to make an opportunity out of it by advancing the construction," says Tykus Holloway, Executive Director of the Mayor's Office of the National Western Center. Without crowds and livestock, crews continued work on site drainage, relocating railways and utilities, and getting pad sites ready for construction. They followed protocols for Covid-19 and had no outbreaks or slowdowns due to the pandemic. "Right now, the 2021 schedule remains as planned," says Holloway, which includes a bridge over the Platte River, new roadways, and completing the new Stockyards Event Center. Looking further ahead, Holloway acknowledges revenue from the tourism tax and entertainment venues has been impacted and says the City Dept. of Finance will balance the best timing to release bonds with the project's need for funds to proceed with construction.

3 HUGE CIVIC PROJECTS IN How did the pand

Central 70

What is it and why is it happening? 200,000 vehicles a day currently traverse the 10-mile stretch of I-70 from Brighton Blvd. to Chambers Rd. and demand is increasing—but deficiencies exist in the old infrastructure and it lacks the capacity to handle projected future demand.

This 10-mile stretch is being reconstructed to add one new express lane in each direction, remove the aging 57-year-old viaduct, lower the interstate between Brighton and Colorado boulevards, and place a park over a portion of the lowered interstate. Substantial completion is projected for end of 2022.

How big is this project? 20 bridges are being built, and nearly 37,000 linear feet (or about 7 miles) of new sidewalk will be added with the new bridges and roadways including at Colorado, Dahlia, Holly, Monaco, Quebec, and Peoria. Wide

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

The 1.2 mile viaduct will be torn down and traffic (starting in 2021) will move to the new roadway that gradually goes down 60 feet lower than the current viaduct height (30 feet underground). A 3-block long tunnel will be built in the lowered roadway—and a 4-acre park above it will reconnect the Elyria and Swansea neighborhoods that got separated when the I-70 viaduct was built.

A new express lane system with transponders will let drivers choose a reliable trip for a toll or a general-purpose lane for free. Carpoolers (3+ people) and motorcyclists are free.

How is it funded? This \$1.2 billion project is funded the Colorado Bridge Enterprise (76%), Senate Bill 228 (16%), Denver Regional Council of Governments (DRCOG) (5%), and the City and County of Denver (3%).

Some unique features: 1) As a public-private partnership, Kiew-

it Meridiam Partners will operate and maintain the highway for 30 years after completion. 2) Toll rates will be based on keeping the right number of vehicles in the express lanes so travel times are reliable. 3) Swansea Elementary, located next to the viaduct demolition site, got an \$18.5 million renovation. 4) The community was given a \$2 million grant to build affordable housing. 5) 56 residences and 17 businesses in the project right-of-way were acquired by CDOT. 4) The 4-acre park will include sports fields, water features, playground equipment, and other amenities requested by the community.

How did the pandemic affect the project? The governor deemed construction to be essential so the project was not interrupted and hiring continued through the year. Workers followed CDC guidelines and no Covid-19 outbreaks occurred that slowed progress. Workers were divided into crews; if a crew quarantined after a positive exposure, only a small group ended up at home on sick leave.

Project funding was not impacted by the pandemic. With lower traffic volume, Quebec to Chambers got paved in daylight hours, offering much safer conditions for workers than nighttime work.

Denver International Airport

What is the project and why is it happening? The airport (DEN), now 25 years old, was built for 50 million annual passengers. Pre-pandemic it reached 69 million and was projected to hit 80 million by 2025 and 110 million by 2040.

Phase I of DEN's Gate Expansion Program (to be completed in 2021) is building 39 new gates and renewing concourse infrastructure. Phase II concourse improvements (to be completed in 2024) will include renewing restrooms and furnishings and installing new moving walkways and escalators.

Phase I renovation of the Great Hall (to be completed in 2021) is adding four ticketing areas with a total of 82 self-bag drops for United and Southwest, upgrading restrooms, and adding space to improve passenger flow and security. Phase 2 (starting in the summer of 2021) will move the south screening area from level 5 to level 6, make the screening area more secure, and upgrade screening technology.

Size of the project? Each concourse will be expanded by several thousand square feet, increasing gate capacity by 30%. The Great Hall, which has 1.5 million square feet, is adding 16,000 sq. ft. for passenger screening. DEN is the 5th busiest airport in the U.S. and the 20th busiest in the world.

How is it being funded? All projects are part of a \$3.5 billion capital improvement program funded by airport bonds. The Gate Expansion cost is \$1.5 billion, (continued on page 13)

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

The Power of the HBCU Model Comes to DPS

aving experienced learning in both majority white and majority people-of-color spaces, tears start to form in Shakira Abney-Wisdom's eyes as she reflects on the value of belonging. The passion Abney-Wisdom, principal of the newly created Robert F. Smith STEAM Academy in Montbello, feels for her community is evident. Clad in a vivid purple dress, an orange and red necklace that looks like a sunset, and a rainbow headscarf, she exudes the same passion about the power of the HBCU (Historically Black Colleges

of the HBCU (Historically Black Colleges and Universities) model for the new DPS high school—a model that is especially significant for students' sense of self-worth and belonging.

The new school is named after East High School graduate Robert F. Smith, who is a Black American investor, inventor, engineer, philanthropist, and entrepreneur. "Modeled after Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCUs), with a comprehensive approach that incorporates science, technology, engineering, art, and math," according to Denver Public Schools' literature, it adds to the slate

of options DPS offers to its students. Like other HBCU style institutions, Robert F. Smith STEAM Academy centers Black/African-American culture and history throughout its design: curricula, educator background and expertise, professional development opportunities, and even school celebrations.

One of the most striking aspects of the school is its interdisciplinary approach to curriculum. Students may be reading a poem in art class that is thematically tied to a text being discussed in English class. Or students may learn about scientific racism and the history of medical experimentation on the black community in history class, and have that tied a real world example in the story of Henrietta Lacks in biology. Content is approached holistically, and topics from one subject flow into the next to give students opportunities to make connections

and find insights—as well as to empower decision-making that involves multiple variables or truths. Abney-Wisdom cites the example of a clothing store purchase, which involves not only cost considerations, but consideration of one's personal style, clothing already owned, seasonality, etc. "How we move in the world should have an analogous process in the way we learn," she posits.

HBCUs have operated in the United states for over 180

years, and the vast majority of them emerged following the Civil War to provide Black Americans with educational opportunities denied to them during enslavement and in segregated educational systems. In many ways, the creation of these colleges and universities highlights the tenacity and resilience of the Black community through unspeakable hardship. Creating pathways to education, employment, and empowerment where none previously existed, often

in the face of active opposition and sabotage, is a running theme in African-American history. HBCU's have a long, lesser-known history of inclusive practices and diversity, notably welcoming many Jewish academic faculty during the 1940s as they were fleeing Nazi rule in Germany. Today, 1 in 4 students enrolled at an HBCU is non-Black.

The HBCU model is not just about empowering African-American students and faculty by providing spaces focused on their historical and cultural experiences, it is about what we can all learn and gain from Black history and narratives. Understanding American culture, history, art, literature, etc., through a Black lens offers all American students complex ways to understand themselves and their communities and to navigate the world.





A new film from a first-time director and a wonderful film collection from the Sie Film Center give you plenty of great options this month. Start a different kind of binge and support local cinema.

Land (2021)

This directorial debut from Robin Wright is a film that couldn't have been released at a better time. It tells the story of Edee (Wright), a woman who has experienced a trauma and moves to a cabin in Wyoming to get away from civilization and live off the grid by herself. She is ill-prepared, however, and she falls apart during the harsh winter, finally helped by a local hunter (Demián Bachir). He and a nurse care for her and bring her back from the brink of death. He then proceeds to teach her how to live in the wild—hunting, fishing, and growing food.

This is a quiet film, one where shots of the landscapes outnumber the amount of dialogue. Filmed in Alberta, Canada, the landscapes are by turns beautiful and tranquil as well as unforgiving and deadly. Cinematographer Bobby Bukowski is able to capture both states with precision and grandeur-finding just the right mix of the beautiful, the precarious, and the sublime.


In one scene, as she cleans out her shed, a Grizzly pays a visit and ransacks her house, eating all of her meager provisions as well as highlighting the dangers of her environment. She suddenly realizes how everything can turn very quickly in her new world. It is for this reason why the film is perfect for the now: we all, at one point

or another, have fantasized about ditching the world of traffic and cellphones for the quiet and tranquility of the mountains. Yet it all comes at a cost. If we have learned one thing over the last year, it is that we need, even *crave*, human connection. That connection may be the essential characteristic of humanity—a fact that Edee learns


just in time. How she got there in the first place is finally addressed near the end of the film, and where life will lead her is left open. What is not left open, however, is that desire to be human.

The Denver Film Society/Sie Film Center has a visual treat for everyone this month: a tribute to the great Hong Kong director Wong Kar-Wai. Wong is one of the world's great directors, an artisan who is also cinephile's



dream. The Center will be showing most of his films this month, including As Tears Go By, Fallen Angels, Happy Together, In the Mood for Love, The Hand, Chungking Express, and Days of Being Wild. On 2/18 they add 2046 and Ashes of Times Redux.

Sight and Sound magazine called him the innovator of the nineties and said he "broke new ground and changed the medium irrevocably." He has an exquisite eye and an intimate relationship with the city he calls home. His most recognizable film of the bunch may be In the Mood for Love (2000), which tells the story of a man (Tony Leung) and woman (Maggie Cheung) who develop a close relationship after they find out their own spouses are having an affair with each other. It is a lush and sensuous film, with gorgeous cinematography, expressive editing, and a wonderful soundtrack. If you only get to see one film, make it this one. But instead of binging a new online series this month, binge one of the great directors of a generation.

six lots designated as restaurant or drive-thru (with interest from coffee, desserts and lunchtime places), one lot for a bank or credit union, a car wash, Brandt Hospitality Group, and a Quik Trip gas station/store/small restaurant with prepared foods. QuikTrip plans to build their headquarters in the lot

(continued from page 5) the concourse renewal is \$560 million, and the Great Hall is \$770 million.

Some unique features: 1) Concourses A & B west, with all new gates going to United, will have a new outdoor deck with views of the mountains, a pet relief area, outdoor seating and fire pits. 2) Concourse C east, with all gates leased to Southwest, will have an outdoor deck with the same amenities and a view of the prairie.


How did the pandemic affect the projects?

More than 1,000 people a day worked on DEN's projects. With strict safety measures, they had no work stoppages due

to Covid-19. The gate extension work was not impacted by the pandemic since it was an areas with no passengers. With TSA work in the Great Hall could be done during the day, rather than at night, with the lower passenger numbers, and was finished ahead of schedule.

Being a good outdoor destination, DEN had 12 to 15 percent more passengers than the average for U.S. airports—and it has many domestic flights, which were less impacted than international flights. Though 2020 passengers were 60% of 2019's level, DEN had a 500day cash-on-hand cushion to weather it. DEN offered relief packages to stakeholders in 2020 and in 2021, which eliminated the minimum guarantees in contracts and deferred lease payments.

Plans call for three national brand drive-thrus to be located along CPB, two sit-down restaurants (one a breakfast group), a church already in Central Park that will have shared parking with a daycare next to it, a financial institution, a medical clinic, a potential hotel, and a 30,000 sq. ft. "high profile" retail anchor.

A light will be installed at CPB and E. 46th Pl., and the E. 46th Pl. median will be modified to allow turns into the development. The site plan is posted at FrontPorchNE.com

3 Natural Grocers Coming to MLK & CPB

The lot just east of the Control Tower (formerly Punchbowl) will have a to-be-determined building right at the MLK/

CPB intersection. Natural
Grocers will be on the north

Ave. It will include a "high-end, vertical, hydroponic, computer-managed structure" for growing fresh lettuce and greens that will be sold in the store. Evergreen Development, which developed the Eastbridge Town Center and the Shops at Beeler Park, will do the construction for Natural Grocers and they hope to start this spring. There will be no access from Central Park Blvd.

4 338 Apartments Starting Construction in Aurora

The 9.27 acre site at 2201 Clinton will have 338 dwelling units in four buildings arranged around an interior private parking area. Trammell Crow Residential is the builder.



Ground floor retail is planned in Building 3, which faces Clinton St. at 23rd Ave. in the new apartment complex at 2201 Clinton St.

The property has frontage along Westerly Creek where there will be a park area and public path along the creek. The buildings are four and five stories tall with a gross floor area of 402,553 sq. ft. The director of preconstruction, Doug McNeil, says vertical construction will be visible in 6 to 8 months. The two buildings along Westerly Creek should be ready for occupancy in two years, and the Clinton St.-facing buildings will be ready for occupancy in about two-and-a-half years. McNeil describes the apartments as "nice but not luxury."



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Sand Creek Greenway

When a grant for the 275-foot mural along the Sand Creek trail was withdrawn due to the pandemic, the non-profit Sand Creek Greenway Partnership raised funds to make it happen.

- By fall cyclists will be able to enjoy a 12-foot wide concrete trail that connects the 14-mile long Sand Creek Greenway to the High Line Canal trail in Aurora and to the South Platte River trail in Commerce City.
- A massive stretch of concrete that used to support a runway over I-70 now celebrates wildlife along Sand Creek
 Greenway with a 275-foot mural whimsically depicting the species that have made a home there since the airport
 moved: foxes, beavers, bald eagles, deer even an elk that has appeared in the eastern portion of the Greenway.
- A mountain of trash and debris that littered the steep bank of Sand Creek just west of Havana has been cleaned
 up, creating a peaceful and natural stretch of the stream where mallards "dabble" with their green heads down
 and their bottoms up as they graze on underwater plants.

and Creek Greenway is being transformed from a creek that used to hide under airport infrastructure to a gem of nature and recreation in the city.

An upgraded trail for cyclists—Paving of the trail on the north side of Sand Creek will begin in late February and is expected to be completed by fall. The concrete trail will be 12-feet wide, with a 4-foot crusher fine path at its edge. The Sand Creek trail project includes adding a paved parking lot and a formalized trailhead near the confluence of Sand Creek and Westerly Creek. "Our hope is that in the future we can get some additional funding to build restrooms there as well," says Denver Parks and Recreation's Cincere Eades. The \$3.5 million dollar project was funded by 2018 bond tax initiative

approved by Denver voters to expand and improve parks and open spaces in the city.

Art and nature—The 275-foot mural is just west of the parking area at the confluence of the two creeks. It was funded by the non-profit Sand Creek Regional Greenway Partnership. Executive director Beth Nobles said originally 50% of the mural's \$23,000 installation and maintenance costs were to be funded by Denver Arts and Venues, but because of the pandemic, the grant was withdrawn. "Our board decided that in times like these, the community can be elevated and energized by doing something good. Art... can build community. The board said to go ahead and raise the money—and we did," said Nobles.

Created by Lakewood artist Yulia Avgustinovich, Nobles says she loves how the



painting incorporates wildlife while allowing the gritty industrial wall to show through. "It really encapsulates our notion of wildlife in the city. People love this mural. They have cheered us for getting this project started and I think there will be a lot of support for future projects to really make this an arts destination," says Nobles.

A safer and more natural habitat—The pandemic, surprisingly, was an incentive to get the cleanup done. "With the increased use of the trails during the pandemic, we felt we needed to remove those materials (concrete, metal and other debris) for safety reasons," says Eades. Much of the debris came from the airport runways that covered

Sand Creek and Westerly Creek. In addition to removing debris from the banks and waters of Sand Creek, the \$500,000 project by Denver Parks and Recreation and the Mile High Flood District will stabilize the creek banks and restore some of the topography that was damaged from unauthorized BMX bike trails that had been created in the area. "That kind of bike use destroys the vegetation and leads to erosion, so we are always trying to educate the public and do outreach about why it's so important to stay on designated trails," said Morgan Lynch with the Mile High Flood District.

together and then write down their thoughts and feelings. "I emphasized the importance of bearing witness," says Muñoz, a Central Park resident who teaches at Denver Center for International Studies at Baker. "I've been insisting that students write about their experiences over the past 10 months with the pandemic and the Black Lives Matter uprisings. I actually had one student who said

half-jokingly to me: 'I'm tired of living in history.'"

The Capitol siege, followed by impeachment, and inauguration of a new president have provided social studies teachers and their students with plenty of history-in-the-making moments to observe, question, and assess. East High School's Matthew Fulford says it can be tricky—especially when some students may feel that the rhetoric they hear is an attack on their identity. But Fulford, who teaches history and constitutional law, says it's critical to have those discussions. "Every social studies teacher has the responsibility—especially right now—to teach civic engagement and help students process what's going on around them. People think of civics as a list of things you need to memorize, but for me 'civics' is a verb. It's about getting engaged with your community."

Democracy

Something We're Working Toward and Aspiring to

Fulford and Muñoz believe that the deep partisan divide, the violence, and the distrust in government is partly due to a lack of education about how government works. "What we're seeing in our country right now is the result of a deficit of prioritizing history and social studies in general. Our inability to place things in context, to understand different points of view," says Muñoz.

"Studying history makes you a better citizen," says Fulford. "It helps you filter information and make decisions about sources. It makes you a better thinker and that helps with citizenship."

Muñoz directly blames the policy of "No Child Left

Behind" that placed a greater emphasis on standardized testing for math and reading. "If it's not tested, if it's not a hard skill, then it's not a priority, it's not funded and it's not supported. If the last four years haven't taught us how badly we need to teach history and civics, I don't know what will," says Muñoz.

Both teachers also agree about the importance of helping students get outside their own bubble so they can encounter other points of view. Fulford pointed to a program started by an

East High School sociology teacher where students do an exchange with Columbine High School. Students spend a day at each other's schools and then spend time reflecting on it. "They examine their biases about each other: the inner-city school and the suburban school," says Fulford. "It's a powerful experience. The schools are just 10 miles apart but it's very much a cultur-

nity. "Across this divide, we have to find ways to be around other people—and not in the toxic way that manifests itself on social media," says Muñoz. He adds that students—and frankly all Americans—need to have authentic conversations and interactions with people who have different beliefs, experiences, and backgrounds.



Matthew Fulford teaches history and constitutional law at East High School. He coaches East's constitutional law team that competes and has won state and national competitions.

"We need to ask 'what has been your lived experience?"" Fulford says he has shown his classes a documentary about a program in Israel that brings Jews and Arabs together to try to bridge the divide between the two groups. "You stop making grand generalizations about other people when there's a real person in front of you. I don't think we're as fractured as Jews and Arabs in Israel. But we're pretty

Both Fulford and Muñoz took sharp issue with the 1776 Project report that was issued by the Trump administration in January. The report rejected the idea that slavery was central to America's founding and attacked "identity politics" as an attack on America.

"Not one of the members on that commission was a historian, yet they claim we're sowing disunity by not teaching 'true history.' Or they call us revisionist historians. Those are terms you only use if you don't understand the exception-

> al complexity of history," says Fulford. "The job of a historian is not about telling comfortable myths. It's about coming to terms with who you are and the history of now."


"The U.S. Constitution is an optimistic document—despite who wrote it," says Muñoz. "I've always framed democracy not as a structure you employ but as an aspiration. There have been

patently undemocratic moments in history, but they don't cancel the idea of democracy. They show that it's something we're working toward and aspiring to."

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
